

REFLECT AND RESPOND 2nd Sunday of Advent

FIRST READING (IS 11:1-10)

About two hundred years after the death of King David, the prophet Isaiah in around 760 BC prophesied the arrival of a new and ideal 'King David' ("a shoot shall sprout from the stump of Jesse") that would bring about peace among people and animals. How can any of us today help make this promised future a reality?

SECOND READING (ROM 15:4-9)

Paul taught the Roman Christians that being a welcoming and unified community of Jewish and Gentile believers was one way to glorify God. Do you think your group of friends are welcoming to others?

GOSPEL (MT 3:1-12)

John the Baptist taught the people that repenting of sins and producing "good fruit" was essential for preparing for the kingdom of Heaven. What good works are you doing for your family and friends as we continue through the season of Advent?

GOSPEL MEDITATION



At sixty years of age, Maria and Paul had a beautiful life. High school sweethearts, they had four children, five grandchildren, a successful business, good friends and a fabulous beach house. They felt very blessed. Their strong faith in God saw them through some difficult challenges. Without warning, Paul died suddenly. Maria was devastated. Why did God do this? Why did God allow this to happen? An indescribable depth of sadness weighed heavily upon

her heart. She felt betrayed by the God she thought was looking out for her. She was overwhelmed by despair. Have you ever experienced such incredible and deafening sadness? Where is God in all of the pain?

We often want God to fix things or intervene and change nature's course. When He doesn't act as we desire, it shakes our faith. We do not always understand or appreciate why things happen as they do. There is much that is beyond our control. John the Baptist prepared the way for Jesus and Jesus is the way to God. There is something more going on in life than what we can see with human eyes. We are on a sacred path, and God is with us. God is with us in our confusion, suffering, doubts, and intense sadness. Jesus announced God's vision for humanity and taught people to see God and themselves for who they are. There is a way through and beyond all hardship and suffering. God does not abandon us.

God has a clear vision for the future, both for us individually and for our world. It is a vision of harmony and gentleness where all will live as one and the "wolf shall be a guest of the lamb." God is not indifferent. He is the God of "endurance and encouragement." In God, we see what we may be, what may come, and who we can become. When Maria opened herself to God's creative presence, she learned to trust. She began to realize that she could endure more than she had imagined. She also discovered a spark of encouragement, bringing her through the sadness to where she could be. In retrospect, Maria knew that God's reassuring presence was with her.

CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

QUESTION:

Why do Catholics make the sign of the cross?

ANSWER:

The sign of the cross is a devotional practice that dates back to the first Apostles. When making the sign of the cross, we remember Jesus Christ who died for us and also bear witness to the fact that we belong to Him and are called to share the Good News to all the world. At our Baptism, we were signed with a cross and marked for Christ. That mark remains on us throughout the entirety of our lives. We remind ourselves of that mark every time we make the same gesture over our



bodies. We also remind ourselves that to be a Christian means we are to "put on Christ" and be Christ for a world that needs to know Him. In a way, this devotional gesture covers us with Christ so that others may see Him in us.

Catholics are not the only ones who make the sign of the cross. Orthodox, Lutheran, and Anglicans are examples of other Christians who maintain this same ancient tradition.

ST. AMBROSE

Bishop and Doctor of the Church




St. Ambrose was born to an aristocratic Roman Christian family in 339 in what is now Trier, Germany. One popular legend tells of a swarm of bees alighting on the infant Ambrose's face and leaving behind a drop of honey which his father took as a sign that Ambrose would be an eloquent speaker with a 'honeyed tongue.' Ambrose was educated in law and rhetoric in Rome. Like his father, he went into public service and was made governor of Ligruaia and Emilia about 373. In the second year of his governorship, he went to moderate the election of the bishop of Milan because the heretical Arians were challenging the succession. Unbaptized and untrained in theology, Ambrose was called by popular acclamation to be bishop. Though he attempted to flee, he was found and within a week he was baptized, ordained, and consecrated bishop on December 7, 374. As bishop Ambrose studied scripture and the writings of Church fathers, he gave his property and wealth to the poor, and became an impactful orator, hymn writer, and renowned teacher. He highly praised consecrated virginity, likely influenced by his sister who

took the veil. A contemporary with St. Martin of Tours, he also defended the faith against the Arian heresy (which questioned Christ's divinity), and against the state. Ambrose required Emperor Theodosius do public penance after the massacre of Thessalonica. His classic education contributed to his writing and sermons which attracted and converted St. Augustine of Hippo who St. Ambrose baptized. St. Ambrose is one of four original doctors of the Church. He died in 397 in Milan, Italy. His remains can be seen today at the Basilica di Sant'Ambrogio, where he lays with St. Gervasus and St. Protasus.


ST. JUAN DIEGO CUAUHTLATOATZIN Religious

St. Juan Diego (1474–1548) was a poor and humble peasant of the lowest class of Aztec Indians living in what is today Mexico. His native name was Cuauhtlatoatzin, meaning, "eagle that talks." He was baptized at the age of fifty by a Franciscan missionary priest and received the Christian name of Juan Diego. It was he to whom Our Lady appeared as a pregnant Aztec princess on December 9, 1531—at that time the feast of the Immaculate Conception—on the hill of Tepeyac, in present-day Mexico City, as he was on his way to Mass. To help Juan Diego prove to the bishop that she had truly appeared, the Virgin Mary miraculously left her image on his tilma. This image is



now famously known as Our Lady of Guadalupe. St. Juan Diego's tilma still bears the image of Our Lady (miraculously, as the plant fibers normally disintegrate in 15-20 years) and it hangs in one of the most famous Catholic pilgrimage sites of the world, the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City. Juan Diego was canonized in 2002 by Pope St. John Paul II as the first indigenous saint from the Americas.

ST. DAMASUS I Pope



Pope St. Damasus I (306-384 A.D.) was born into a Christian family in Rome. He became a deacon and served at the Basilica of St. Lawrence in Rome where his father served as a priest. After the death of Pope Liberius, Damasus was elected Pope in the year 366 A.D. Violence broke out as a rival pope was also elected, and the two factions fought to enforce their candidate. Damasus was confirmed as the rightful pope by the Roman Emperor, and the anti-pope was banished from the city. Pope Damasus chose the scripture scholar St. Jerome as his personal secretary, to whom he commissioned the translation of the Bible into Latin (the Latin Vulgate). It was during Damasus' reign that Christianity was declared the religion of the Roman state. Pope Damasus also called the Council of Rome in 382 A.D. to clarify the canon of Sacred Scripture. He opposed heresy, worked to preserve the catacombs, and advocated for devotion to the Christians martyred under the Roman persecutions. His feast day is December 11.



LETTER FROM ARCHBISHOP LUCAS Moving Forward in the Journey of Faith

Dear friends in Christ,

I write to you at an important moment in our Journey of Faith process. Teams have been working for months in families of parishes across the archdiocese. They have been imagining how to shape a vibrant future for our parishes while respecting the blessings of the past and recognizing current realities.

For decades we have experienced significant shifts in where people choose to live. Within parishes large and small, family members and neighbors are choosing not to participate in parish life in growing numbers. Also, the segment of Nebraskans who claim no religious affiliation is growing. The number of priests available to serve in parishes has been shrinking and will continue to do so for the foreseeable future.

Understandably, we want to maintain what we are used to in our parishes, no matter their size. That will simply not be possible, nor is it a prudent response to the command of Jesus to share the gospel in every time and place.

As we receive the plans from families of parishes, I plan to review them carefully. I will consider the schedule and administrative changes necessary to meet our planning parameters. I know that this has involved difficult choices for rural parishes particularly. It is likely that Sunday Mass will no longer be offered in several churches in the future, although it will be available nearby. I know that this means a painful loss for faithful parishioners, but I do not see another way to meet our goal of establishing stable pastoral structures for the next ten years.

Beyond structural and administrative changes, I will be anxious to see how families of parishes imagine a way forward in Christ. Our parishes must become missional communities or face continued diminishment. The task for us now is to deepen our relationship with Jesus and learn how to evangelize our neighbors so that they, too, can have life in Jesus. As our parishes begin to work together, rooted in prayer, we will find that the gifts of the Holy Spirit needed for this task are abundant and powerful.

I ask for the support of your prayers as I review the plans and offer any needed revisions. Pray, too, that as the plans are communicated to parishioners in the coming weeks, there will be an openness to receive them thoughtfully so that implementation can begin in mid-2023.

Jesus has promised to be with us in the church until the end of time. He is with us now. He has plans for abundant life for us and for those who do not yet hear His voice. May all of our trust and all of our hope be in Him.



SIX THINGS YOU SHOULD DO BEFORE MASS

Tips From the "Father and Teacher of Youth"

It's important to show proper reverence for Mass! Besides fasting, how are you preparing to best receive the Eucharist? Saint John Bosco, the "Father and Teacher of Youth," suggested six resolutions for Mass-goers:



1. Try to be early for Mass always. A few minutes spent in before Mass can open your soul to wonderful Graces.

- When you enter or leave the church take Holy Water and sign yourself with the Sign of the Cross.
- 3. Always genuflect when you enter or leave your seat. This is an Act of Adoration to Almighty God, present in the tabernacle. So take time to genuflect reverently, facing the altar and saying "My Lord and My God" as your right knee touches the floor.
- 4. Don't talk in church unless absolutely necessary. Talk only to Jesus—it is Him you have come to visit. Don't talk as you leave either. Some people may still be praying.
- 5. Listen to the sermon. It is a message from God which could bear much fruit for you.
- 6. Don't start to leave church until the priest has returned to the Sacristy. Stay to thank God for the Graces you received from Him in the Mass.

With his suggestions, Bosco added a reminder that "every day we take a step closer to Heaven, that every act should be for the greater glory of God and that every morning we should renew our resolve to work for the Salvation of souls." Saint John Bosco, pray for us!

MAKE QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTIONS Donate by December 31



WHAT IS A QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTION (QCD)?

Generally speaking, a QCD is a non-taxable distribution made directly from a traditional IRA (other than an ongoing SEP or Simple IRA) to a qualified charitable organization, such as St. Patrick Catholic Church of Gretna.

WHAT IS THE BENEFIT?

QCDs reduce your adjusted gross income and potentially reduce your taxable income and the tax due. If you file a joint return, your spouse can also have a QCD. You Qualify if:

- You are over age 70 ½
- You are taking Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs) from a traditional IRA
- You are making charitable contributions
- The QCD is paid directly by the trustee of your IRA to the charitable institution

CAN A QCD SATISFY MY RMD FROM AN IRA?

Yes, your QCD can satisfy all or part of the amount of your RMD from your IRA. For example:

- If your 2021 RMD was \$10,000, and you made a \$10,000 QCD in 2021, you would have satisfied your 2021 RMD.
- If your 2021 RMD was \$10,000, and you made a \$5,000 QCD in 2021, you would have had to withdraw another \$5,000 to satisfy your 2021 RMD.

HOW TO MAKE A QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTION TO ST. PATRICK

- 1. Contact your IRA trustee or financial institution for its procedures for QCDs.
- 2. Determine the amount that you want to contribute (up to \$100,000) and advise your IRA trustee or financial institution.
- 3. Keep proof of your contributions such as a statement from the charitable institution and from the paying institution.

WHEN PREPARING YOUR TAX RETURN

- 1. Your 1099-R will likely show the full amount of the distribution as taxable income. Note: There may be exceptions that you will need to verify with your payor.
- 2. Tell your tax preparer the amount of the QCD. The taxable amount on the 1099-R will need to be *reduced* by this amount.
- 3. Only the reduced taxable amount will be included in your income.
- 4. Include proof of your contributions with tax documents for the year.
- For more information, see IRS Publication 590-B, Distributions from Individual Retirement Arrangements (IRAs).

Before making such a gift, here are some simple questions and answers that will help you as you discern your gift.



If I gift stocks, will I still incur any capital gains taxes?
 No. If the stock has appreciated in value, you can avoid paying the capital gains tax by giving the stock as a gift.

2. What methods are used to gift stocks?

If you hold the shares in a brokerage account, you can simply re-title the shares in the name of the organization—such as St. Patrick Catholic Church of Gretna—to whom you want to gift the stock. You can even set up regular gifts at predetermined intervals. Another way to gift stock is to transfer assets directly to your beneficiaries at the time of your death with a Transfer on Death Agreement (TOD).

3. What tax deduction can I get for gifting stocks to charitable groups? If you donate appreciated stocks that you've held for more than a year to a "public" charity—such as a religious organization—you can typically take a tax deduction for the full fair market value of the stocks, up to 50% of your adjusted gross income for that year.

So, as you can see, gifting stock is a great way to give to St. Patrick. Please consult your tax advisor for specifics.






