# **REFLECT AND RESPOND** 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

### FIRST READING (MAL 3:19-20A)

The prophet Malachi speaks of God's judgment at the end of time and the importance of fearing the Lord. What do you think it means to "fear" the Lord?

### SECOND READING (2 THES 3:7-12)

Paul talks about himself (and Silvanus and Timothy) as a "model" on how to behave for the believers in Thessalonica. Who are some family members that you think model the faith well?

### GOSPEL (LK 21:5-19)

Jesus forewarned His disciples that because of their faith in Him, they would be persecuted, even "handed over by parents, brothers, relatives, and friends ... hated by all because of my name." How would you react if your family and friends hated you because of your belief in Jesus?

# **GOSPEL MEDITATION**



Many make it their life's ambition to determine precisely when the world will end. By reading the signs of the times, consulting scripture, or looking to prophetic predictions that are sometimes centuries old, they claim a certain credibility in being able to do so. Is all that necessary to know? Even when His disciples pointedly asked Him this question, Jesus did not directly answer. While the end will inevitably come, Jesus points out that there is a lot we need to

do first: remain faithful, face persecution, endure suffering, face wars and insurrections, and give testimony. Human beings tend to focus their energies on the wrong kingdom. Consumed with all of the things we have built and seeking to preserve them, we forget that we belong to a different kingdom, the Kingdom of God.

All of the "stuff" we have constructed will be taken away. All that will remain is God's kingdom. Which kingdom do we prefer? We answer that question by honestly looking at where we invest most of our time and energy. What matters to us as we embrace a new moment or day in our lives? If our relationship with God, the strength and integrity of our souls, and the steadfastness of our character are of utmost importance, then it matters little when the physical end will come. We will have what we need to persevere, endure, and confront whatever comes our way. Jesus cautions that we do not allow ourselves to be overwhelmed or overly terrified by the agonies and disappointments of the world. Although we may be apprehensive and uncertain when faced with complex challenges, God is with us. We will receive the inspiration we need to forge ahead.

God is a God of salvation and new beginnings. Whether we consider the daily unfolding of our earthly lives or our eternal ones to come, God never leaves us with dead ends. There is always hope, and there is always something new to come. As Julian of Norwich reminds us, "God made us, God loves us, and God keeps us." This wisdom holds true whether life is stable and profitable or challenging and uncertain. If we remember this simple truth, we will be ready regardless of the day or the hour.


# CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

### **QUESTION:**

How does a person become a canonized saint?

### ANSWER:

It is important to remember that all the saints are people, real people who lived just as we do! The first saints of the Church were martyrs or theologians known for a holy life. Over time, the Church has established a set process to investigate the causes of saints.



Typically, they must wait five years to ensure any false enthusiasm has lessened. With Vatican approval, the process begins and the person receives the title "Servant of God." The first phase involves collecting information about the person's life and scrutinizing it carefully. One person has the specific role of raising doubts—this is the origin of the phrase "devil's advocate!" When it is clear the person truly lived a heroically holy life according to Church teaching, they are declared "Venerable."



If the person is a martyr for the faith, they will also be declared "Blessed." If the person is not a martyr, they must be credited with a miracle. This is also closely examined for authenticity. Once the miracle is authenticated as truly a miracle performed by God through the person or through their intercession, they are beatified. An additional authenticated miracle is required before canonization, and we can call them "Saint."

# ST. ALBERT THE GREAT Bishop and Doctor of the Church



St. Albert the Great (1206-1280) was born in Bavaria, Germany, the eldest son of a powerful military count. As a youth he was sent to study at the University of Padua where he encountered and entered the newly-founded Dominican order as a mendicant friar, forsaking his inheritance against his family's wishes. He was the first Dominican to earn a Master of Theology degree and was sent as a lecturer to the University of Paris (which at that time was the intellectual center of Europe) before launching a Dominican house of studies in Cologne. He introduced the works of Aristotle to western thought which allowed his most brilliant student, St. Thomas Aquinas, to synthesize the Catholic faith with human reason, that is, the truths established through philosophy. St. Albert the Great was a renowned scholar and a pioneer in the field of natural science, keeping his own laboratory for scientific experiments. He is known as one of the greatest thinkers of his day, called by his contemporaries "the teacher of everything there


is to know" for writing an encyclopedia of all human knowledge up to that point in history. St. Albert the Great was also one of the most famous preachers of his day and served as the papal theologian in Rome. He was declared a Doctor of the Church in 1931 by Pope Pius XI. St. Albert the Great is the patron saint of scientists and philosophers.

# ST. MARGARET OF SCOTLAND Mother and Reformer

St. Margaret was born in exile around 1045, in what is now Hungary. She is the daughter of Princess Agatha of Hungary and Edward the Atheling, the Anglo-Saxon heir to the throne of England. The family returned to England, but Edward died soon after their arrival, making Margaret's brother Edgar the presumptive heir. However, the Norman Conquest would turn their world upside down. Agatha and her children fled the country. They likely intended to go back to Hungary, but they were shipwrecked off the coast of Scotland. King Malcolm Canmore III took the exiles under his wing, and he fell in love with the beautiful, gracious Margaret. Although she initially rebuffed his proposals, the couple were married in 1070 at the castle of Dunfermline. Margaret and Malcolm had eight children, six sons and two daughters. Margaret brought



culture to the Scottish court and used her influence to soften her rough husband. The saint led a life of austerity, aiding Church reform, promoting Easter communion, and founding churches and monasteries. She instituted the Queen's Ferry to the shrine of St. Andrew and founded pilgrimage hostels. Saint Margaret, Queen of Scotland, died on November 16,1093, four days after her husband and eldest son were killed in the battle of Alnwick.



# BL. MARIA FORTUNATA VITI

Blessed Maria Fortunata Viti (1827–1922) was born in Italy, the eldest daughter of nine children. Her father had a gambling and alcohol addiction, and her mother died when she was 14 years old. Maria then cared for her younger siblings and worked as a housekeeper to earn money for the family as her father sunk deeper into his addiction. Maria rejected an offer for marriage, deciding instead to become a Benedictine nun at the age of 24. Sr. Maria Fortunata, illiterate her entire life, spent more than seventy years in the

monastery as a housekeeper attending to the washing, sewing, and other simple tasks, which was her path to holiness. She was admired for her great simplicity of heart, and her confessor testified that she was often accosted by the devil with threats, physical attacks, and vile insults in attempts to break her virtue. She had great devotion to the Blessed Sacrament and made frequent visits to the chapel tabernacle as she carried out her daily tasks. She died at the age of 95, and after her death miracles were reported at her grave. She is a patron saint against poverty, temptations, loss of parents, and mental illness.



# GIVING OPTIONS AT ST. PATRICK CATHOLIC CHUCH Celebrate Giving Tuesday, November 29

Celebrated on the Tuesday following Thanksgiving, *Giving Tuesday* kicks off the charitable holiday spirit and motivates end-of-year giving. At a time when we are all experiencing the challenges of a tight economy and high inflation, generosity is what brings people of all races, faiths, and political views together across the globe. Generosity gives everyone



the power to make a positive change in the lives of others and is a fundamental value anyone can act on.

St. Patrick Church asks all parishioners to prayerfully consider their return to God and His Church through stewardship consisting of these equally important elements—Prayer and Presence, Gifts of Service or Time and Talent, and Financial Gift or Treasure. We are a tithing parish and recommend 5% of a family's gross income go to our parish, 1% to the Omaha Archdiocese, and 4% to other charities of your choice.

### ELECTRONIC FUNDS TRANSFER (EFT)

Through EFT, the parish office manages your online tithing account for you where you authorize St. Patrick to debit your bank account or credit card, allowing an automatic deposit into the bank account of St. Patrick. This is referred to as a "Managed Account." If interested, visit the home page of our parish website and click on the Online Giving button, then under Electronic Funds Transfer, click on the "EFT Form" button. Print out and return this completed authorization form to the parish office with your voided check or savings deposit slip or provide your credit card information on this same form.

### **ONLINE GIVING**

Online Giving allows you to directly manage your own account where you can make contributions without writing checks or worrying about cash donations. This is referred to as an "Independent Account." You can access the St. Patrick online contributions page where you can set up and directly manage an account for automatic giving via checking, savings, or credit card, determine the timing or amount of your recurring gifts, or provide one-time donations for special collections or causes. Simply go to the home page of our parish website and click on the Online Giving button, and under Online Giving, click on the "Sign Up Now" button.

### ENVELOPES

If electronic or online giving is not an option for you, St. Patrick offers church offering envelopes on a bi-monthly basis (e.g., a pack of a two-month supply of envelopes are mailed to you every other month). This occurs automatically upon registration as a parishioner unless the parish office has been notified that you do not wish to receive envelopes due to your choice of one of the other giving options. As you know, St. Patrick also gladly accepts cash donations at Mass. However, if you want us to record your contribution and include it on giving statements for income tax purposes, we can only do so if you use envelopes, contribute by check, EFT, or online giving.
