REFLECT AND RESPOND *The Epiphany of the Lord*

FIRST READING (IS 60:1-6)

Nearly five hundred years before the birth of Jesus, the prophet Isaiah foresaw a time when all the nations of the world would see the glory of the Lord shining upon the people of Israel. How do you think the birth of Jesus reveals to the world the glory of God?

SECOND READING (EPH 3:2-3A, 5-6)

Paul wrote of the "mystery" that was revealed to him, namely, the Gentiles and the Jews (all believers) were "coheirs" and "copartners," equal members in the body of Christ. How can we celebrate this wonderful message of inclusivity with others?

GOSPEL (MT 2:1-12)

Matthew includes the story of the visit of the magi to teach us how the birth of Jesus fulfills the prophecies of Isaiah (first reading) and the prophecies of Micah (Mi 5:1), the prophetic text that Matthew quotes. Who are some people today you think need to hear about Jesus?

GOSPEL MEDITATION



A friend of mine is a young priest who teaches high school physics at a Catholic boys' prep school. Like many today, the boys often think science and religion are enemies. So, he delights in their raised eyebrows when he reminds them his first full-time job as a priest was to be an astrophysicist. He cataloged the size, shape, and matter of distant stars. He tells them, "Science gave me more love for God, not less."

The Magi were something like scientist-astronomers. Like today's scientists, they employed disciplined methods of discovering dependable patterns in the world. Their rigorous commitment to the truth led them to the joy of discovering Jesus. Their love for knowledge leads them to worship the Source of all knowledge. Luke says of them, "They were overjoyed at seeing the star."

We may see the universe as cold and empty and feel sad. But why should we do that? The Magi, like my priest-friend, show us there is another way to experience the world. We use our intelligence to discover the beautiful patterns in the world—in mathematics, physics, astronomy, biology, neuroscience, and so on—and allow this to lead us to greater love for God. So, my fellow Magi: the world needs us to be overjoyed at finding God in science and, finally and fully, in Jesus.

CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED


QUESTION:

How are the feasts of the baptism of Jesus and the account of the wedding feast of Cana related to the Epiphany celebration?

ANSWER:

The Epiphany season focuses on revealing Jesus to the world. Following the Christmas celebration, the liturgical year lays out a series of manifestation points in which Jesus is made publicly known. From its very beginning, the Christian community highlighted three events in the life of Jesus. These are the Epiphany, the Baptism of the Lord, and the wedding feast at Cana.

The Epiphany discloses Jesus to the world of the Gentiles, represented by the magi from the East. The accounts of Jesus' baptism reveal His identity and mission, along with exposing Him to those to whom He was sent to minister. The miracle of turning




water to wine at the wedding feast of Cana, unique to John's Gospel, is the first public sign that Jesus performs, thus manifesting His public identity and His powers.

Today in the Roman Church, these are usually celebrated on three successive Sundays: Epiphany, the Baptism of the Lord which is usually the next Sunday, and the wedding feast of Cana, which is proclaimed on the 2nd Sunday of Ordinary Time in lectionary year C.

These feasts connect around the concept of epiphany, public manifestation of Jesus to the world. They help us get to know more intimately who Jesus is and what He is about. Spend some time delving more deeply into your understanding of who Jesus is. Continue to cultivate these "epiphany" moments in your life.

ST. APOLLINARIS CLAUDIUS Bishop



St. Apollinaris Claudius (2nd c.), also called St. Apollinaris of Hierapolis, was a bishop in what is today Turkey. He became famous for his polemical writings against the heretics of his day, showing that their theological errors were taken from the pagans. His most famous work was an Apologia for the Christians addressed to Roman Emperor Marcus Aurelius in the year 177 A.D. In it he reminded the Emperor of a miracle he received because of the Christians: when his army was nearly defeated in an

attempt to conquer the Germanic barbarians, it was the prayers of the Christians among his soldiers which obtained the needed relief and the military victory, even though Christianity was illegal. In light of this miracle, Apollinaris requested the Emperor's protection of Christians from persecution. St. Apollinaris' work earned him the moniker, "Apollinaris the Apologist." His writings are largely lost, and what we know of his work comes to us from other early Christian writers including Sts. Jerome and Eusebius. His feast day is January 8.

ST. ADRIAN OF CANTERBURY Abbot

St. Adrian of Canterbury (d. 710 A.D.), also known as St. Hadrian, was a native of North Africa who was sent to England to accompany his friend, Theodore of Tarsus, who was appointed to the prestigious archbishopric of Canterbury. St. Adrian was originally offered and turned down the ecclesiastical position, and instead was made abbot of St. Augustine's Abbey at Canterbury (originally called the Monastery of St. Peter). The monastic school grew and thrived under his leadership, and became an important center of learning where many future



scholars, bishops, and abbots were educated in Latin, Greek, scripture, theology, Roman law, arithmetic, and other subjects. St. Adrian himself was well known for being a great teacher of religion, math, science, and literature. He also served as the Holy Father's assistant and adviser. During the lives of Adrian and Theodore, education and learning flourished in England. After his death, his tomb became famous for miracles. His feast day is January 9.

LEONARD LARUE Servant of God



Leonard LaRue, or, Benedictine Brother Marinus LaRue O.S.B., had his cause officially opened for sainthood in June 2021. This incredible man was born in Philadelphia on January 14, 1914, and died on October 14, 2001, at the age of 87. While captaining the 7,600-ton U.S. Merchant Marine ship, the SS Meredith Victory, during the Korean war, Leonard led the largest humanitarian rescue operation by a single vessel in history, whether during war or civilian conditions. Under his leadership, his crew and he evacuated 14,000 Korean refugees, including women and children, to safety. To accomplish this, he swiftly unloaded all cargo from the

freighter and allowed as many refugees as could possibly fit into the five empty cargo spaces and onto the deck. Despite the extreme cold, lack of adequate food and water, the fact that the crew didn't know Korean, and the refugees didn't know English, communist submarines hunting for them, and constant shelling and fighting nearby, he managed to transport all 14,000 refugees 490 miles southeast to safety. They arrived at Geoje Island on Christmas day with no injuries along with 5 additional people added to their numbers as 5 women gave birth during the treacherous two-day ordeal. LaRue's successful deliverance of those under his protection spoke volumes of his bravery and love of those who were victims of war and violence. According to the U.S. Department of Transportation Maritime Administration, his mission is remembered as a Christmas miracle and "One of the greatest marine rescues in the history of the world." Captain LaRue remained in command of the Meredith Victory until it was decommissioned in 1952. Inspired by the Benedictine monks, Leonard entered St. Paul Benedictine Abbey in New Jersey as a monk in 1954 shortly after the decommissioning of his ship. There, he lived out the rest of his life as Brother Marinus LaRue in prayer among the brothers of his religious community. He was the Abbey's dishwasher, bell ringer, and gift shop attendant.

EPIPHANY HOUSE BLESSING 20+C+M+B+23

You may have seen it before over the doorway of a Catholic friend: 20+C+M+B+22 chalked on the lintel. This means that your friend's house has been blessed with a very special, very old custom. The custom echoes the Passover, wherein the Jewish people would sprinkle lamb's blood over their doorways as an invocation of God's



blessing for their household. The Epiphany Blessing is performed near the feast of the Epiphany, which commemorates the visit of the Three Wise Men. Blessed chalk is now used to mark the doorways for this Catholic blessing. It's a tradition that began in Eastern Europe. After Epiphany, the village priest went to every home in his parish with specially-blessed Epiphany water and chalk. Upon entering the home, he prayed special prayers and blessed every room in the house.

Bless, O Lord, almighty God, this home so that in it there may be health, chastity, victorious strength, humility, goodness and mildness, obedience to God's laws and acts of thanks to God the Father, Son, and the Holy Spirit, and may this Blessing remain upon this house and upon all who dwell in it. Through Christ Our Lord, Amen.

After this the numbers of the year, enclosing the initials of the Magi (Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar) are written with the blessed chalk over the door. The Magi's initials also stand for a Latin house blessing: *Christus mansionem benedicat* (May Christ bless this house). Now that parishes have increased in size and priests are no longer able to visit every home, the head of the household is permitted to perform a basic Epiphany house blessing himself.







WHAT IS A "MYSTIC"? A Term Often Associated with the Greatest of Saints

Mysticism is an intimidating word. We instinctively associate it with saints who had incredible supernatural experiences—such as St. John of the Cross; Padre Pio; Teresa of Ávila; Faustina Kowalska. These saints certainly were mystics. But what makes a mystic a *mystic*? Is it an inaccessible reality, something beyond us everyday mortals? Let's find out.

The word "mysticism" refers either to the tendency or the desire of a soul for union with the divine, or to a philosophical or religious system built upon that desire. Interestingly, mysticism is found not only in Christianity; other religions have an idea that the ultimate end of man is union with something divine. It seems that there is an innate mystical impulse in all of us—an impulse that must be very strong if it is found even in religions that don't possess the fullness of truth. Well, it "seems like" it's in our nature because it is. St. Augustine said:



"Thou hast made us for Thyself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in Thee." The human heart longs (whether knowingly or unknowingly) for final union with God and the beatific vision consists in exactly that.

We can tap into mystical realities right here on earth through prayer, and we don't have to be great saints to do it. The saints themselves—especially St. John of the Cross and St. Teresa of Ávila—have taught us how to pray. While the higher levels of mystical prayer—such as "unitive" prayer—take time to acquire (and not everyone will achieve the same levels), the pathway is open to us all. We can embark on it and follow that impulse towards God which He has planted in all our hearts. But be careful. As said above, many religions and pseudo-religions talk about mysticism. Only the Catholic Church, however, has the full truth and can teach us how to seek it properly. Non-Catholic mysticism is spiritually dangerous. Ignite your love of true mystical prayer with the book *Fire Within*. In this highly-accessible guide, spiritual director and retreat master Father Thomas Dubay introduces you to the prayer and spirituality of St. John of the Cross and St. Teresa of Ávila. It's a perfect starting point for deepening your prayer and living a truly mystical life.

PRIESTLY UNIFORM: THE ROMAN COLLAR We all Recognize Priests by this Special Vesture



Priests began wearing the standard cassock about three or four hundred years before the iconic collar. In the interim, collars changed according to the times. Then, in 1624, the Church concluded that the time had come for clerical garb to have stricter guidelines. Why 1624? Well, collars had grown into major fashion statements by that time. No matter how plain or embellished the rest of the garb, the collar was the crown of it all. Linen was the most common


material, but the high class could display impressive, filigree collars of lace. The fancier the collar, the wealthier the owner!

The Church, however, wished both the clergy and laity to always remember what a priest is: Christ's representative on earth, who is consecrated to God, and who embraces material poverty as did Our Lord. For a priest to wear collars of expensive materials was incongruous with this aspect of his calling. So Pope Urban VIII forbade ornamentation or lace and the Church regulated the fashionable collars to simple ones. Today, we are familiar with the most common form of this simple collar: the "Roman collar," with its simple white square.

DISTRUST IS TEARING AT MY INSIDES

"Jesus complained to me in these words, **Distrust** on the part of souls is tearing at My insides. The distrust of a chosen soul causes Me even greater pain; despite My inexhaustible love for them they do not trust Me. Even My death is not enough for them. Woe to the soul that abuses these [gifts] (St. Faustina's Diary, 50)."

HOW DO I KNOW IF IT'S A MORTAL SIN? Is it Wrong, Sinful, or Mortally Sinful—What's the Difference?



Everyone knows—or almost everyone does—that there are morally good actions and morally evil actions. But when is an action not only wrong, but sinful? And particularly mortally sinful? After all, as St. John says, "all wrongdoing is sin, but there is sin which is not mortal" just as "there is sin which is mortal" (1 John 5:16,17). A mortal sin is one that "destroys in us the charity without which eternal beatitude is impossible. Unrepented, it brings eternal death" (CCC

1874). That's what makes it "mortal," or deadly: it cuts us off from God forever, unless it is "redeemed by repentance and God's forgiveness" (CCC 1861).

Thanks be to God, not every evil action is mortally sinful. So how do we know which is which? Just as there are three ingredients in evaluating a moral action (the object, intention, and circumstances), so there are three ingredients in a mortal sin: (1) "grave matter," (2) "full knowledge," and (3) "deliberate consent." And the Catechism is clear that all "three conditions must together be met" (CCC 1857).

If all three are met, it's mortally sinful. Otherwise, "one commits venial sin when, in a less serious matter, he does not observe the standard prescribed by the moral law, or when he disobeys the moral law in a grave matter, but without full knowledge or without complete consent" (CCC 1862). That's still a problem, since venial sin "weakens charity" and "impedes the soul's progress in the exercise of the virtues and the practice of the moral good," and "deliberate and unrepented venial sin disposes us little by little to commit mortal sin," but venial sin does not (of itself) "deprive the sinner of sanctifying grace, friendship with God, charity, and consequently eternal happiness" (CCC 1863).

What does "grave matter" mean? It means that the sin is serious. But how do we evaluate the seriousness of a sin? The Catechism is explicit about the grave nature of particular sins, including sacrilege (CCC 2120), blasphemy (CCC 2148), perjury (CCC 2152), deliberately avoiding Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation (2181), murder (2268), hatred of neighbor "when one deliberately desires him grave harm" (CCC 2303), prostitution (CCC 2355), sexual relations outside marriage (CCC 2390), and adulation that "makes one an accomplice in another's vices or grave sins" (CCC 2480). St. Paul likewise gives lists in Galatians 5:19-21 and 1 Corinthians 6:9-10 of sins whose practitioners will not "inherit the kingdom of God." But none of these lists is exhaustive.

More broadly, the Catechism says that "grave matter is specified by the Ten Commandments" (CCC 1858), pointing to Jesus' words to the rich young man. When the man asks Him, "Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?", Jesus answers, "You know the commandments: 'Do not kill, do not commit adultery, do not steal, do not bear false witness, do not defraud, honor your father and mother'" (Mark 10:17,19). Jesus' clear implication seems to be that those who do commit adultery, steal, etc. shall not inherit eternal life.

Even here, there are two important caveats. On the one hand, not every violation of the Ten Commandments is a mortal sin. For instance, the person who steals a dollar is not necessarily damned. On the other hand, not every mortal sin is a direct and obvious violation of the Ten Commandments. St. Thomas Aquinas considers this objection directly in considering the sin of gluttony: "Every mortal sin is contrary to a precept of the Decalogue: and this, apparently, does not apply to gluttony." Aquinas argues that gluttony is an indirect violation of the Third Commandment (keeping the Sabbath holy) by turning us away from holiness. That's a strange answer, but he explains: "Mortal sins are not all directly opposed to the precepts of the Decalogue [Ten Commandments], but only those which contain injustice: because the precepts of the Decalogue pertain specially to justice and its parts." In other words, the Ten Commandments lay out "the first principles" of the moral law; they're not an exhaustive list of every serious sin. The right question is this: is this the kind of behavior that places something else above God or turns me away from God? If so, it's grave matter.

In considering whether or not a sin is mortal, circumstances matter. For instance, the Catechism points out that "one must also take into account who is wronged: violence against parents is in itself graver than violence against a stranger" (CCC 1858). Likewise, stealing from the excess wealth of a millionaire is less evil than stealing the food of a starving man. Taking the example of lying, the Catechism explains how to determine the gravity of a sin: "The gravity of a lie is measured against the nature of the truth it deforms, the circumstances, the intentions of the one who lies, and the harm suffered by its victims. If a lie in itself only constitutes a venial sin, it becomes mortal when it does grave injury to the virtues of justice and charity" (CCC 2484).
