

REFLECT AND RESPOND

The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph

FIRST READING (SIR 3:2-6, 12-14 OR GN 15:1-6; 21:1-3)

Abraham and Sarah relied on their faith in the Lord as they struggled with family matters. When have you needed to rely on faith when it comes to your family?

SECOND READING (COL 3:12-21 OR 3:12-17 OR HEB 11:8, 11-12, 17-19)

Hebrews teaches us that at every challenge in his life, Abraham consistently trusted and obeyed God. When have you had to surrender complete trust to God?

GOSPEL (LK 2:22-40 OR 2:22, 39-40)

In their purification ritual in the Jerusalem Temple, Mary and Joseph learn news from Simeon and Anna about their newborn baby, Jesus. In your family, how do you deal with startling or unsettling news?

GOSPEL MEDITATION



I remember the first time my older sister asked me if I wanted to hold her newborn son. Terrified, I told her I didn't think it was a good idea. My résumé had nothing to suggest I would be a qualified baby holder. But she warmly told me, "I'll help you hold him." It struck me that she is baby's mother. She is the one who decides who is qualified to hold him. I took him in my arms and soon I began to feel comfortable with that tiny little warm cooing creature in my arms, and soon I no longer feared holding him. Now, twenty-seven nieces and nephews later, holding a newborn child is one of the great joys of my life.

Do we sometimes think that Jesus is given only to the highly qualified, special religious people? In the Gospel of Luke today we hear about the presentation of the Lord in the temple. The newborn son of God is passed around like a baton in a relay race, not guarded like a precious jewel or a breakable china dish. We can see Him going from the arms of Mary to Joseph, then to the priest performing the ceremony, then to Simeon the old man, then to Anna the old widow. Each one receiving Him and then handing Him to the next. A tidal wave of joy and thanksgiving follows wherever He is placed.

Believe me, you are qualified to hold Jesus in your arms. How can I say that with such confidence? Because the mother decides who is qualified. The Blessed Virgin, embodied in the Church, holds Him out to you and me. She rejoices to place Him in our arms to hold, and to hand Him on, too.

CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED


QUESTION:

What are the servant songs of Isaiah? How do they relate to Jesus' life and ministry?

ANSWER:

The four servant songs (Isaiah 42:1-4, 49:1-6, 50:4-9, and 52:13 -53:12) are strategically placed in Second Isaiah to offer hope and consolation to a suffering Israel during its Babylonian Exile.

Israel had been defeated by the Babylonians, who destroyed their temple, killed the last of the kings in David's lineage,



Each of the four poems emphasizes God's choice and election of the servant. The last poem stresses the suffering and rejection of God's servant, along with his eventual death. Isaiah is certain that God will use the servant's innocent suffering as a way to redeem and remove the guilt and sin of others. Thus, the servant becomes a source of salvation for himself and for others.


Who is this servant? Many suggest that Isaiah was referring to Israel herself, as she underwent exilic suffering which would ultimately prove to be redemptive. Jesus' followers, including those for whom Mark wrote his Gospel, understood Jesus' ministry in terms of Isaiah's suffering servant whose innocent suffering and death became the means of salvation for all.

ST. SYLVESTER *Pope*

Pope St. Sylvester (c. 250-335 A.D.) was born in Rome and raised as a Christian under the care of pious parents, and the religious instruction of a devout priest. He was later ordained to Holy Orders in Rome, and witnessed the outbreak of Christian persecution under the Emperor Diocletian. During this time he became well-known as a good and holy priest, so much so that when the Pope died, Sylvester was appointed the new Bishop of Rome. Little is known about Pope St. Sylvester other than the many important events in Church history that



occurred under his pontificate. He was the reigning pope during the Council of Nicea which condemned the Arian heresy and established the Nicene Creed; he was the Holy Father who converted and baptized the Roman Emperor Constantine; Rome's greatest churches were built under his direction by Constantine, including St. John Lateran, St. Peter's, and Santa Croce; and the Church saw the beginnings of temporal prosperity and the establishment of the Christian Roman Empire. Sylvester was Pope from 314 A.D. until his death in 335 A.D. His feast day is December 31.

SERVANT OF GOD MOTHER MARY ELIZABETH LANGE Religious



Elizabeth Clarisse Lange's early life is not well documented. She was born between 1783 and 1794, some sources claim her birthplace as San Domingo, Hispaniola, others suggest Santiago de Cuba. One story relates that her mother was the daughter of a Jewish plantation owner, and her father was enslaved on the property. Most agree, however that she grew up in Santiago de Cuba, Cuba, and received an excellent Catholic education, her family one of some means. Eventually, Lange immigrated to the United States as a free person and ended up in Baltimore, Maryland in 1813. In Baltimore at the time, free people of color outnumbered those who were enslaved and there was

an established community of other French-speaking, Catholic, Afro-Caribbean refugees from the Haitian Revolution. Despite her education and means, as a black woman in a society marked by slavery and racism, she faced numerous obstacles in pursuing her vocation. In the early 1800s, there were few opportunities for black women to receive the proper education or training specifically needed to enter into religious life. Nonetheless, Lange persevered in pursuit of her calling, and once in Baltimore, she became involved with the growing community of black Catholics in the city. Lange began working as a teacher and catechist, helping to educate and evangelize the city's black population. There was an incredible need for education for black children at the time because they were not permitted in Baltimore's public school system, so Lange opened a free school to serve youth of color inside of her home. During this time, Lange met Fr. James Nicholas Joubert, a French priest who shared her vision of establishing a congregation of black sisters. Together, Lange and Joubert worked to lay the foundations for what would become the Oblate Sisters of Providence—the first black religious congregation in the United States. In 1829, Lange and three other women made a private commitment to live a religious life under Joubert's guidance. The following year, they formally established the Oblate Sisters of Providence, taking vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience. Lange served as the congregation's first superior, overseeing its growth and development over the next several decades—becoming the first-ever black superior general in the Americas. She took on the name Sister Mary. The Oblate Sisters of Providence faced many challenges in their early years, both from within and from outside of the Church. As a congregation of black women, they were subject to discrimination and prejudice, including from some of their fellow Catholics. Nonetheless, the sisters persevered in their mission to serve God and their community by opening schools and orphanages as well as providing spiritual and material assistance to those in need. Lange herself was known for her deep spirituality, her tireless work ethic, and her compassion. Her example inspired many other women of color to consider religious life and the Oblate Sisters of Providence grew to become a thriving congregation with a strong sense of mission and purpose. Mother Mary Elizabeth Lange died on February 3, 1882, at the age of 88. She was declared Venerable on June 22, 2023, and she is remembered as a trailblazer, a visionary, and a woman whose faith and perseverance helped to break down barriers and create new opportunities for black Catholics in the United States.



PRAYER HABITS TO KEEP YOUR FAITH ALIVE Five Practices Throughout the Day

As Saint Josemaría Escrivá said, "A Catholic without prayer is the same as a soldier without arms." In addition to the great treasure the Church offers us in the sacraments, Catholic Tradition provides various devotional practices to help us in our daily walk of faith. Here are five beautiful prayer habits to keep your faith alive throughout the day:



 Spiritual Reading—One of the best spiritual reading options is the Gospels and the Daily Liturgy, but you can also read homilies, books about the lives of the saints, and the Catechism of the Catholic Church. Thus, by knowing more about faith, growing in friendship with God is possible. In general, 15 minutes is recommended to start, but you can increase it as your spiritual life develops.

relatives and friends, and in particular for the intentions of the Holy Father. Amen.

- 3. Mental Prayer—Saint Teresa of Avila said, "Prayer is not thinking much but loving much," so don't see this moment as a list of petitions or memorized things you need to say. Use this moment to talk to God as a friend, presenting your life, pains, joys, struggles, dreams, and family. God loves you and listens to you. Even though He already knows what you are going through, He likes to hear from you. This can also take about 15 minutes, and you can increase as it becomes more natural for you.
- 4. Pray the Rosary—On the eve of His death on the Cross, Jesus, looking at His beloved disciple John, gave him Mary as his mother, and thus, all of us, His disciples, also received her as our mother. She is a short and safe path to God, as she knows how to obey the Father's will like no one else. Therefore, being close to her makes us want to be faithful to God and walk towards holiness. As Mother and Teacher, she wants to take care of us and lead us to Heaven.
- 5. Examination of Conscience—No matter how much we struggle with sin during the day, we often hurt God's heart with our attitudes, thoughts, and omissions. Therefore, the moment before going to sleep is an excellent opportunity to come before God with our weaknesses, ask for forgiveness, and make the intention of trying to be better tomorrow.

Let us remember: God always forgives us, we are the ones who tire of asking for forgiveness. It's always time to start over!







WHEN YOU FEEL YOU'VE LOST JESUS, TURN TO MARY Our Lady of Sorrow Brings Us to Her Son

Joyful religious sisters, brothers, and priests are almost magnetic in how they draw young people to consider living lives of radical holiness. As a young girl, I felt this attraction to religious life, and during my early adulthood, I seriously considered this way of life. It was certainly a winding journey, one that climaxed with a beautiful moment where the Lord spoke directly and clearly to me in 2020. After a few years of seriously discerning with a religious order, I understood that God was not calling me to enter the convent after all. This realization initially brought the fruits of good discernment: peace, joy, and clarity.



But this moment didn't last forever. As a member of those who have officially "discerned out," I quickly experienced a surge of discomfort and sadness. In addition to the peace and clarity, there are also bumps, hills, and drops filled with doubt, uncertainty, mourning, and even shame—shame that, somehow, I must have missed my cue. I was left not knowing what direction to take, and at times I felt stuck or even lost. Even three years later, I sometimes experience the uncomfortable feeling that maybe I heard God wrong, that maybe my current singlehood is an indication that I messed up.

PRAYING FIAT AMID THE SORROW

Recently, I took a weekend away at a hermitage to rejuvenate and refocus. Prior to going, I felt drawn to meditate on Our Lady's Seven Sorrows. I spent long periods praying through each sorrow, but at one point, my own discernment journey began coming to mind. I attempted to shove down the familiar queasiness at my guilt and confusion. After a bit of internal fighting, I finally brought it to the Lord and shared my thoughts with Him: While I wanted to trust Him, I couldn't help but feel discomfort in still not knowing my vocation. I had been so sure where God was leading me, but then I ended up somewhere completely different, and I wasn't sure what to do about it.

Well, our Lord (an excellent Retreat Master, by the way) quickly responded to my prayer—not with answers, per se, but through a strong sense of Our Lady's presence and empathy. One of the Seven Sorrows of Our Lady was losing Jesus for three days in Jerusalem. If anyone has experienced the sensation of "discomfort in not knowing," it was certainly Our Lady when she, Joseph, and Jesus went to Jerusalem when Jesus was 12. One moment, she had her son, and the next—gone. I'm sure she felt her heart drop to her stomach like every mother does when, for half a moment, it looks like her child is missing. Except this was for three whole days.

I read a meditation that considered what was going through Our Lady's mind during these three days. Scripture is clear that she and Joseph searched with "great anxiety," but what flashed through her mind? Did she consider, "is this my son's time?" Did she fear that she would never see Him again? Did she think, "I never should have let Him out of my sight"?

Despite our questions, we can be certain of one thing Mary would have done: She would have repeated her fiat: "Your will be done." A phrase once said in joy at the Annunciation, but one that encompasses Our Lady's spirit of surrender to the Father, as she certainly would have done in these moments, too. When day after day passed without finding Jesus: fiat. When she finally did find Him and exclaimed, "Why did you do this to us?," His answer that He must be about His Father's business left her perplexed. And still, in spite of lingering confusion, she would have prayed: fiat.

TRUST IN THE WAITING

It was in contemplating this mystery that my own shame melted away. The Blessed Mother, my mother, understood me so completely because she had lived it herself. She was following God's will by taking her son to the annual Temple pilgrimage. And yet, somehow, the trip was completely turned on its head. I felt Mary's reassurance that, in my vocational discernment, I didn't fail God. She, too, didn't always understand what God was doing in her life, where He was leading her, or why she had to wait to find Him again. What is important is continuing to trust God and surrender to Him even in our lack of understanding.

Our Lady's presence and companionship is something in which we can all find comfort. Whether we are still discerning a vocation, worrying about a loved one, or heartbroken over loss, Mary is the best empathetic listener to our sorrows. She can comfort her children in ways only a mother can. And, in her motherly way, she lovingly shares her wisdom with us and helps us to take the next step out of our uncertainty and worry and into trust: fiat.

HOW IS SOMEONE NAMED A DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH Great Teachers of the Faith



The Doctors of the Church are teachers of the faith who have demonstrated exemplary holiness and have deepened the whole Church's understanding of the Catholic faith. They must be officially declared doctors by a papal proclamation. Such men and women also are known particularly for the depth of understanding and the orthodoxy of their theological teachings. Though

their teachings are not infallible, being a "doctor" means that they contributed significantly to the formulation of Christian teaching in at least one significant area in a way that has impacted later generations. Through the Middle Ages, the title and process of being named a doctor remained a fluid and informal one. In the 13th century, however, the Church formalized the process by which the Church could honor persons with the title and then put out the first official list of Doctors of the Church. There are three requirements for being named a Doctor of the Church. First is great sanctity. Thus only those who have already been declared to be saints by the Church may be named a doctor. A second requirement is eminent learning. This is often demonstrated by the fact that they were known to be great teachers of the faith. The third requirement is a proclamation by the Church. Usually, such proclamation is made by the pope.


