

REFLECT AND RESPOND 4th Sunday in Ordinary Time

FIRST READING (DT 18:15-20)

Moses taught the Israelites that God would raise up a prophet like him to teach them the Lord's commands. But he also forewarned about false prophets. How can we avoid listening to false prophetic voices?

SECOND READING (1 COR 7:32-35)

Paul expresses his desire for the Corinthian believers to be free of anxiety so they can focus their attention and energies on Jesus. What distracts you from the Lord?

GOSPEL (MK 1:21-28)

Mark informs us that early in Jesus's public ministry His "fame spread" quickly throughout Galilee because of His powerful deeds, such as the healing of the demon-possessed man in today's reading. Is there something or someone in your life that you pray Jesus would heal?

GOSPEL MEDITATION



I love movies about exorcisms. Apparently, so do many others. The 2023 movie *Nefarious* features a possibly possessed inmate on death row. Critics were not impressed, but audiences scored it at 97% on the website *Rotten Tomatoes*. Most people have an appreciation for the demonic realm, even if cultural elites are generally embarrassed about it. As is standard in exorcism movies, the afflicted person (in this case, a man named Edward Brady) thinks and acts like multiple persons. He is someone besides himself. We know what that is like. We feel fake sometimes, not ourselves.

The same dynamic is on dramatic display this week in the Gospel. Jesus the Exorcist approaches a possessed man who utters, "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth?" Notice the plural, us. The basic effect of the demonic is division. The man's identity is fractured, divided, and thus many. Jesus powerfully expels the spirit by saying, "Quiet! Come out of him!" Jesus' word has the power to restore the man's singularity—him—and indeed it does.

All this helps us to dismiss childish images of demons sporting red goat tails. Equally, it overcomes the cultured aloofness that dreams demons are mere metaphors for evil. We see instead that fallen angels are conscious and intelligent beings who orient their agency toward division. They bring about schism where there should be unity, e.g., in persons, families, communities, politics, and so on. Thankfully, Jesus commands demons to flee from all these places to restore wholeness and peace. What if we made room for His word where we need it?

CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

QUESTION:

I have a friend who receives communion, but who I know for a fact is in a state of mortal sin. Should I tell our priest? Is it my responsibility to say something?




ANSWER:

While we may always want to do what is best for our friends and family members, we have a responsibility to respect their privacy and their conscience. In its reflections on the Eighth Commandment "You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor", the Catechism of the Catholic Church states, "Respect for the reputation of persons forbids every attitude and word likely to cause them unjust injury. [One] becomes guilt:—of rash judgment who, even tacitly, assumes as true, without sufficient foundation, the moral fault of a neighbor;—of detraction who, without objectively valid reason, discloses another's faults and failings to persons who do not know them; of calumny who, by remarks contrary to the truth, harms the reputation of others and gives occasion for false judgments concerning them" (no. 2477).

We will never truly know what is in a person's mind, heart, and soul; only God knows those things. We should, of course, take our concerns to God and entrust the person about whom we are concerned to God's grace and mercy. If we have concerns about the spiritual wellbeing of someone with whom we are close, we should go to the person themselves and talk about our fears and concerns. Unless it is a case of abuse or endangerment (which we have a moral and even legal responsibility to report to the appropriate authorities), we ultimately do not have the freedom to share another's persons faults or sins, however good we think our intentions might be.

SAINT AQUILINUS OF MILAN Priest and Martyr




St. Aquilinus of Milan (d. 1015 A.D.), also known as St. Aquilinus of Cologne, was born to a noble family in Bavaria, Germany. He received his education in Cologne, Germany and was ordained to the priesthood. He was offered the bishopric of Cologne, but turned it down in order to be a missionary priest and itinerant preacher. He traveled through various European cities fighting against the dangerous and spreading heresies of the Cathars, Manichaeans, and Arians. He was also known to work miracles by healing people from disease,

especially during a cholera epidemic. He eventually settled in Milan, Italy, and was so effective in his preaching against the Arian heretics that they stabbed him to death and threw his body in the city sewer. His body was recovered and buried in the Basilica of San Lorenzo, in a chapel which now bears his name. His feast day is January 29.


SAINT JOHN BOSCO Priest

St. John Bosco (1815–1888) was born in Italy to a poor farming family. His father died when he was two, leaving his religious instruction to his pious mother. At the age of nine he had his first of many powerful visions which would come throughout his life. In it Jesus and the Virgin Mary showed him that he was to instruct poor, wayward boys and bring them back to God. John eventually joined the priesthood, paying his way through school with odd jobs. As a priest he began ministering to the poor and neglected boys of Turin, Italy, who were driven to



desperate conditions in the wake of the Industrial Revolution. Many of these street boys ended up in prison as teenagers. Don Bosco became a mentor and spiritual director to them, helping them to live a life of virtue and saving many from a future of crime and poverty. He met with them as a group—called the Oratory of St. Francis de Sales—and catechized them as a kindly spiritual father. He also established the Salesians of Don Bosco, priests and brothers who minister to and educate boys under the patronage of the great spiritual director, St. Francis de Sales. Don Bosco is the patron saint of boys, laborers, young people, students, and Mexican young people. His feast day is January 31.

SAINT IGNATIUS OF ANTIOCH Bishop and Martyr



St. Ignatius of Antioch (35-108) was a bishop of Antioch in the first century which, at the time, was the capital of Syria. One of the earliest bishops, he was a disciple of the apostle John and was a prolific writer and teacher of the early faith. Throughout his ministry, he emphasized the importance of the real presence of Christ in the bread and wine, considering the Eucharist as the "medicine of immortality" and "the flesh of our Savior Jesus Christ." His writings, particularly his seven epistles, passionately affirmed the significance of partaking in the Eucharistic celebration as a means to unite with Christ and fellow believers. He urged the faithful to hold fast to the teachings of the apostles and the sacraments passed

down through the generations. During the reign of Roman Emperor Trajan, St. Ignatius was arrested for his faith and condemned to be taken to Rome for execution. While in chains making the long journey with Roman soldiers from Syria to Rome, St. Ignatius was allowed to meet with many of the faithful and to write letters to neighboring Christian congregations. His seven epistles from this time and his conviction in the face of martyrdom served as an inspiration to many. His writings live on today as important teachings of the early Church, shedding a light into early Christian theology. St. Ignatius was martyred in Rome's Colosseum when he was thrown to the lions and devoured. He's remembered as the patron saint of Church unity, and the Eucharist. St. Ignatius of Antioch, pray for us!

This favorite quote from St. Catherine of Siena prompts the question, "How do we know who God intended us to be?" It's through seeking truth! There is so much chaos and confusion in the world, and seeking Christian truth involves a journey of faith, prayer, study, and personal reflection. Ash Wednesday is February 14 this year, so to seek Christian truth, let us strive to deepen our personal relationship with Christ through daily prayer and the rosary, join a parish Bible Study, engage in a church group or volunteer activity, attend daily Mass when possible, and begin to experience a deeper growth in our faith. If everyone were to make seeking Christian truth a goal and followed through with it, imagine how the world would be at peace. Mary, Queen of Peace, pray for us!

PARISH LIFE HIGHLIGHTS

Parish life continues to be active and fully alive as represented by these recent highlights:

- Currently, we have 1,521 registered families at St. Patrick.
- From September 1, 2023, through December 31, 2023, we've had 22 baptisms, two funerals, and one wedding.
- Typically we reach between three to five thousand people in a month with the posts on our Facebook page, @stpatgretnane. However, in the month of December alone we reached over 15,000! Thank you for all the likes, shares, and comments as they truly make a difference.
- In the first six months of starting our Instagram account, @stpatgretnane, we already have 144 followers and an average of 50 to 100 views per post.
- After gaining attention with the posts of our weekly Fruitful Friday videos where we
 have been walking through the Mass, we began posting our abbreviated homily
 highlight videos that we call "Christ Within Me" on September 10. These minute long
 videos are posted on our Facebook, Instagram, and YouTube pages on Tuesday nights
 as a reminder to live the Gospel all week long.
- Each week we have been sending the seminarians the bulletin that corresponds to the Seminarian Prayer Corner. They greatly appreciate the prayers as they continue on the path of discerning God's will for their vocation.
- RCIA—In September, we began another year of OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation of Adults). We currently have two candidates as well as two catechumens going through the class in order to learn more about the faith! We hope to welcome them with warm hearts into the Church at Easter.
- Youth Group—Since September, we have been meeting weekly on Wednesday nights
 for Youth Group here at St. Patrick Parish. We started off the year with an outdoor
 Mass at one of our parishioner's acreages. We began the year with a total of 34
 students. At the end of the semester before Christmas break, we ended with 51 teens
 at Youth Group! Youth Group meets every Wednesday night at 7 PM.
- The Youth Group is currently preparing for Fish Fry's and other fundraisers in order to earn money to go on the annual Steubenville trip in Springfield, Missouri over the summer! Please support us with a donation.
- Preschool started in September and we have had a great school year so far. Our teachers have been busy with helping our students



grow academically, socially, and most of all spiritually. We took a couple field trips this fall, including Fontanelle Forest, Omaha Children's Museum, and Gifford Farms. In November and December we were busy practicing for our annual Thanksgiving and Christmas programs. We are preparing now for a new school year and registration will start in a couple of weeks.

- Religious Education (RE) classes began after Labor Day with a volunteer Catechist in every classroom. We have over 50 dedicated volunteers who help with RE every week.
- In September, as we have done the last few years, we had a prayer service dedicating ourselves and the new RE year to the Sacred Heart of Jesus and Immaculate Heart of Mary.
- Each year, we focus on one aspect of living the faith at home. This year's focus is on service and charity. Families are encouraged to practice this by praying for those in need, donating to the less fortunate, and giving time for others.
- This year we added a new initiative for "Biblical Literacy" in our 4th-8th grade RE classes. Instead of reading scripture stories or passages out of the textbook or children's Bible, most weeks they look them up in an actual Bible to give them regular practice using and reading the Bible.
- In October, we all gathered to say the Rosary for our prayer partners, babies and new moms, and an increase in vocations. Our prayer partners are elderly parishioners that we've paired with each class. They pray for each other, and sometimes send cards and notes back and forth, too.
- Our 8th graders attended a Confirmation Retreat at the parish in October. This half day of prayer, reflection, games, and group bonding allowed the candidates to think about how the Holy Spirit is active in their life through prayer, the Church, and those around them like family and friends.
- In November, our 62 second graders received the Sacrament of Reconciliation for the first time. Congratulations!
- Our K-6th graders put on a Christmas program before Christmas break. To celebrate the true meaning of the season, we heard the story of Christmas while costumed players took the parts of the Biblical characters, and younger students sang some traditional
- Laura Rau, our new Director of Sacred Music, has settled into her new position and has been working with the adult and children's choirs and our cantors. She has begun to recruit new choir members and cantors along with instrumental players—woodwinds, strings, and brass—to enhance the music at our Masses. Laura also plans the music for all the liturgical seasons and special liturgies.
- We recently kicked off a new parish mission in support of the Fr. Ssonko Missionary Fund to assist in the missionary work of Fr. John Baptist Ssonko, a priest of the Diocese of Lugazi in Uganda. The primary role of the fund is to raise money to support the operational and capital needs of St. Mary's Primary School in Busaabla, Uganda. The fund also supports Fr. Ssonko's missionary travels and helps Fr. Ssonko with his personal needs. We are pleased to report that for the first half of this fiscal year, we've received \$28,502 in contributions. Thank you for your incredible generosity! We look forward to continuing to support this important initiative.

BUILDING MAINTENANCE

Recently Completed Projects:

- Sanctuary Carpet—Estimated Cost \$68,818; Actual Cost \$66,972—Not only was the project under budget, but we were also able to complete the project a week earlier than anticipated. We would like to thank all the volunteers who helped move chairs in and out of the sanctuary so that Mass could continue to be held at St. Patrick and not be moved offsite while the carpet was being replaced. This was truly a team effort! We are so very blessed to have such a giving parish.
- Parish Center Lighting—Cost \$33,302—All can light fixtures in the Parish Center were replaced with LED fixtures. This not only eliminates costly repairs to the outdated fixtures but lowers the electrical expenses.
- Replacement of Other Light Fixtures—Cost \$7,451—In addition, we replaced several outdated fixtures in the cry room, restrooms, SE and east entrances into the Church with LED fixtures.
- Sanctuary Lights—Cost \$3,372—Ballasts on the hanging fixtures were replaced along with the arch lamps.
- Water Damage—Cost \$2,500 deductible—With the heavy rains in late August, we had water in the Youth Group room, classroom 9, sound room, and Parish Center. It took 5-7 days to determine where the water was coming in and make repairs. Contractors involved were Paul Davis Restoration, Mainelli Construction, Prime Secure, Pyramid Roofing, and Miller Electric.
- Music Area (Raised Floor)—Approximate Cost \$7,059—(We are still waiting on a final invoice from Electronic Sound.)—The music floor is now one level which allows for better utilization of the area. Continued on next page ->

- Card Access Added to the North Transept—Cost \$965—This door is now accessible by contractors and staff. Prior to the installation the nearest access on the north side was the patio door on the lower level.
- Replacement Cameras Installed in the Sanctuary and SE Entrance—Cost \$2,525—The SE entry camera could not be repaired, and the sanctuary camera was obsolete.
 Therefore, both cameras were replaced.

Projects in Progress:

- Sanctuary Lights—We are still exploring options for converting the sanctuary lighting system to LED. Bids are currently being solicited.
- Stained Glass Windows Restoration—Additional windows will be repaired in 2024.
- Parking Lot Repairs—Once spring arrives, we will evaluate the parking lot and sidewalk repairs and proceed as needed.
- Parish Center Audio Visual—We are currently looking for a new contractor to work on the AV equipment. The system today is antiquated and needs to be updated.

As always, repairs and maintenance needs are being addressed as they arise. We deeply appreciate your help in bringing issues to our attention so they may be addressed as quickly and efficiently as possible. If you should have any questions about our facilities and building maintenance needs, please do not hesitate to contact either Father Baxter, Jolene Jefferies, or Judy Knight.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Below is a snapshot of our finances for the first six months of the fiscal year ending December 31, 2023, with a previous fiscal year comparison for this same time period. Our new fiscal year began on July 1, 2023.

Expenses—Overall expenses during this past fiscal year, ending June 30, 2023, were 5.3% less than this same time the previous fiscal year. Many of our building projects and ongoing maintenance needs represent the bulk of these expenses. The next priority project is to work on our sanctuary lighting and update the AV equipment in the Parish Center. Stay tuned for more details on these projects as we work on considering options and soliciting bids.

Income—Overall gross income this period increased by 163.9% compared to the past fiscal year. Contributions during the holiday months this year have helped in this regard. However, in the next half of this fiscal year, we will need additional financial support to complete all the necessary building projects and improvements to keep our parish in the proper condition for many years to come.

THE WAY AHEAD

We look forward to continuing our efforts in supporting the necessary capital building improvements. As we evaluate our options for some of the upcoming building projects and solicit bids, we will keep you updated on the projected expenses and what's next. We ask each parishioner to financially support these projects to the extent possible. We are deeply grateful for all your support and gifts that come in a variety of ways. Many thanks to each of you for all you do for St. Patrick!


