

#### SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE

#### REFLECT AND RESPOND

#### Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord

FIRST READING (IS 50:4-7)

Despite his suffering, we hear how the prophet Isaiah found strength in his faith and fidelity to God. How does your faith help you through professional or family challenges?

#### SECOND READING (PHIL 2:6-11)

Paul taught that central to Jesus's identity was his humility and obedience to God. How well do you practice these Christian virtues?

#### GOSPEL (MK 14:1—15:47 OR 15:1-39)

We hear today Mark's account of the Passion of our Lord. How do you prepare yourself to listen to the Passion narrative?

#### GOSPEL MEDITATION



A few months before they married, my twenty-three-year-old sister and her fiancé planned a cross-country road trip to visit his family. My parents told them that they could only go if they slept in separate hotel rooms, offering to foot the bill. It might sound prudish, but my parents wanted the young couple to understand that their approaching unity was close, but not yet. Patience solidifies love.

What could this possibly have to do with Palm Sunday? It's usually overlooked, but the Gospels tell us that, after entering Jerusalem, Jesus "looked around...and since it was late, went

out to Bethany with the twelve" (Mk 11:11) for the night. Who cares? Why include this detail? Jews in those days believed that the new Davidic King would one day re-enter and "marry" the city. A new future marked by fidelity would begin for God's people. Israel's God would be in union with His people forever. Without over-sexualizing the metaphor, perhaps Jesus refused to sleep in Jerusalem to remind us of His marital purpose. He was entering Jerusalem as the bridegroom-king. It was almost time, but not yet. Soon He will sleep in Jerusalem in the tomb and then something new will begin: His one body, His Church.

**Lenten challenge:** This Holy Week, I challenge you to keep this image in your mind all the way until Easter Sunday: Jesus is the faithful bridegroom who patiently prepares His bride for their new life together. Go to the Good Friday liturgy and kiss the cross. When you do, let that gesture be the long-awaited "I do" to our faithful God, who always waits for us.


#### CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

#### OUESTION:

Do Catholics always need to receive communion in wafer form, or can it be different kinds of bread?

#### ANSWER

In the Roman Rite of the Catholic Church, the most common form for the Eucharistic bread is the small white communion "wafer" that is a ubiquitous part of the Catholic Mass. The instructions of the Church have been very specific regarding the make-up of the bread used in the Mass: "The bread used in the celebration of the Most Holy Eucharistic Sacrifice must



be unleavened, purely of wheat, and recently made...it follows therefore that bread made from another substance, even if it is grain, or if it is mixed with another substance different from wheat to such an extent that it would not commonly be considered wheat bread, does not constitute valid matter for confecting the Sacrifice and the Eucharistic Sacrament" (see *Redemptionis Sacramentum* by the *Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments*, no. 48).

The Church's tradition of using a wheat-based bread is based on the bread that Jesus would have used at the Last Supper and is considered to be an essential part of the "matter" of the Sacrament of the Eucharist.

As we consider the question of whether a "wafer"—which is properly called a "host"— should be used, we also must keep in mind that in the Eastern Rites of the Catholic Church, leavened (i.e. "raised") bread is more often used. And so, while the thin, white "wafer" is most commonly used in the Roman Rite of the Church, the full expression of the Catholic tradition does allow for a more substantial form of bread to be used, but the tradition of using a simple wheat bread with no other additions or additives is considered essential.

# SAINT CATHERINE OF SWEDEN Religious



St. Catherine of Sweden (1331-1381) was the fourth of eight children born to St. Bridget of Sweden and her husband, Ulfo. As a child she was sent by her parents to be educated in a convent, and was later given in marriage to a German nobleman. Catherine was able to persuade her husband, a virtuous young man, to live together in a mutual vow of perpetual chastity. They lived happily together in complete devotion to God. After the death of her father, and with her husband's consent, Catherine accompanied her mother to Rome.

While there, Catherine's husband died. She continued to be a companion to her mother and rejected further offers of marriage. Her mother worked to establish a new religious order, called the Order of the Holy Savior, or the Bridgettines. After her mother's death, Catherine took her body back to Sweden for burial while continuing the work of establishing the Bridgettines. She later traveled back to Rome to advocate for her mother's canonization and for Pope Urban VI to ratify her Order. While in Rome she became great friends with St. Catherine of Siena. St. Catherine of Sweden finally returned to Sweden and became abbess of the newly founded Bridgettines, living the rest of her days as a model of prayer and penance. St. Catherine of Sweden is the patron saint against abortions and miscarriages. Her feast day is March 24.


# SAINT JOHN OF EGYPT Religious

St. John of Egypt (4th c.), also known as John the Hermit or John the Anchorite, worked alongside his father, a carpenter, until he was twenty-five years old. He then discerned a call from God to go out into the desert and become a hermit. He spent sixteen years in spiritual training under the care of a religious superior who commanded him to perform difficult and unreasonable tasks, which John obeyed with childlike simplicity. After this time of spiritual training he withdrew into greater solitude in a small cell at the top



of a cliff, praying incessantly and avoiding contact with people for the last fifty years of his life. He had the gift of prophecy and could perform miracles, and foretold to Emperor Theodosius his future victories as well as the time of his death. People traveled from afar for his counsel or blessings, and to hear him preach. He would receive visitors two days a week from a tiny window in his cell. He became so famous for his holiness that St. Augustine wrote of him, making reference to the devils who came to tempt John continually. St. John of Egypt's feast day is March 27.

# SAINT TORIBIO ROMO GONZÁLEZ Priest and Martyr



St. Toribio Romo González (1900 – 1928) was born in Santa Ana de Guadalupe, near Jalisco, Mexico. He entered seminary at the age of 13 and was ordained a priest in 1922 when he was only 22. As a priest, he dedicated himself to serving the faithful in the midst of the Cristero War, a period of intense religious persecution in Mexico during the 1920s and 1930s. Despite the danger posed by the anti-Catholic government, Romo continued to carry out his pastoral duties. He provided sacraments, offered spiritual guidance, promoted devotion to the Eucharist, and was frequently forced more and more to do so in secret or under the cover of night. He became known

for his compassion and selflessness, often risking his own safety to bring consolation and hope to the persecuted Catholic community, and catechesis, as well as the Eucharist, to the poor. In the late 1920's, a formal law was passed that imposed strict penalties on priests who were found exercising their priestly ministries. Despite the risks, Romo continued to celebrate Mass and administer the sacraments to those in remote areas. For a time, he had to hide in an abandoned distillery in the town of Tequila in order to avoid violence, and celebrated Mass there for the community. Tragically, on February 25, 1928, Romo was murdered. He was shot twice by government troops who broke into his bedroom while he was asleep. His martyrdom became a powerful testimony to the enduring strength of the Catholic Church in Mexico in the face of discrimination. St. Toribio Romo, pray for us!







WHY: God entrusted the Holy Family to St. Joseph to keep them safe, and so should you!


WHO: All St. Patrick parishioners, children, and families

What does it mean for a person to be consecrated to St. Joseph? Well, it basically means that you acknowledge that he is your spiritual father, and you want to be like him. To show it, you entrust yourself entirely into his paternal care so that he can help you acquire his virtues and become holy. Total consecration to St. Joseph means you make a formal act of filial entrustment to your spiritual father so that he can take care of your spiritual well-being and lead you to God. The person who consecrates himself to St. Joseph wants to be as close to their spiritual father as possible, to the point of resembling him in virtue and holiness. St. Joseph, in turn, will give those consecrated to him his undivided attention, protection, and guidance.

Father Baxter will lead all parishioners, children, and families to make their consecration to St. Joseph after the 7:30 AM Mass on Wednesday, May 1.



# DIVINE MERCY NOVENA Good Friday to Divine Mercy Sunday

The Divine Mercy Novena begins on Good Friday, March 29, and ends on Divine Mercy Sunday, April 7. Pick up a pamphlet in the narthex to pray this beautiful novena from home.

How often do you pray the Divine Mercy Novena? Our Lord promised immense graces to those who recite it. You are likely familiar with the messages of Divine Mercy given by our Lord to St. Faustina Kowalska. Perhaps you often pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet that He gave her as part of these revelations.

But do you know the story of how He taught it to her? And what He said about praying this Chaplet as a nine-day novena? In 1935, St. Faustina received a vision of an angel sent to chastise a city. An interior voice inspired her to beseech the Father for mercy, using words very similar to those we now use for the Chaplet. As Faustina prayed, the angel became powerless to carry out his task. The next day as she visited the chapel, again our Lord spoke to her interiorly, telling her to recite the prayer He taught her the previous day every time she entered the chapel.

He said: "This prayer will serve to appease My wrath. You will recite it for nine days, on the beads of the rosary..." He then gave exact instructions on how to pray the Chaplet. Our Lord further gave St. Faustina many promises for the recitation of the Chaplet, speaking to her of its efficacy for the conversion of sinners and for the dying. He specifically requested a novena of Chaplets leading up to the Feast of Mercy (the Sunday after Easter), saying: "By this Novena, [of Chaplets] I will grant every possible grace to souls."

The Novena begins on Good Friday, so be sure to mark your calendar! This novena is immensely pleasing to our merciful Lord and is a source of immeasurable grace for us and those we love.



# GROW CLOSER TO SAINT JOSEPH During March, the Month of St. Joseph

March is dedicated to St. Joseph, husband of Mary and foster father of Jesus. Below are six ways to grow closer to St. Joseph during March:

1. Entrust every intention to his intercession.—Prayers calling on St. Joseph are unique! St. Thomas Aquinas explained: "Some saints are privileged to extend to us their patronage with particular efficacy in certain needs, but not in others; but our holy patron St. Joseph has the power to assist us in all cases, in every necessity, in every undertaking." His patronage covers a vast amount of needs and requests ranging from family troubles to finances, and many things in between. There are various



prayers calling on the intercession of St. Joseph. Here's one prayer outlined in Pope Leo XIII's encyclical Quamquam Pluries (August 15, 1889): "To thee, O blessed Joseph, we have recourse in our affliction, and having implored the help of thy thrice holy Spouse, we now, with hearts filled with confidence, earnestly beg thee also to take us under thy protection. By that charity wherewith thou wert united to the Immaculate Virgin Mother of God and by that fatherly love with which thou didst cherish the Child Jesus, we beseech thee and we humbly pray that thou wilt look down with gracious eye upon that inheritance which Jesus Christ purchased by His blood, and wilt succor us in our need by thy power and strength. Defend, O most watchful guardian of the Holy Family, the chosen offspring of Jesus Christ. Keep from us, O most loving Father, all blight of error and corruption. Aid us from on high, most valiant defender, in this conflict with the powers of darkness. And even as of old thou didst rescue the Child Jesus from the peril of His life, so now defend God's Holy Church from the snares of the enemy and from all adversity. Shield us ever under thy patronage, that, following thine example and strengthened by thy help, we may live a holy life, die a happy death, and attain to everlasting bliss in Heaven. Amen."

- 2. Honor the fathers in your life.—St. Joseph was the earthly father of Jesus Christ and spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary, which earned him the title, Pillar of Family Life. During the month of March, consider honoring the fathers in your life in a special way. This can range from making a meal for your local priest(s), writing a special letter of gratitude for your own father, or offering up special prayers for an increase in virtuous fatherhood in our country.
- 3. **Pray the St. Joseph novena.**—The feast day of St. Joseph is March 19. Traditionally, we begin the novena to St. Joseph on March 10. You can find the full set of novena prayers at https://www.ewtn.com/catholicism/devotions/st-joseph-full-novena-13879.
- 4. Offer up your work to St. Joseph the Worker.—Devotion to St. Joseph as a worker dates back to the Middle Ages when Catholic theologians and writers began to emphasize the role of St. Joseph as a model of humility, hard work, and dedication. Here is the full text of Pope St. Pius X's prayer for his intercession: "O Glorious St. Joseph, model of all those who are devoted to labor, obtain for me the grace to work in a spirit of penance for the expiation of my many sins; to work conscientiously, putting the call of duty above my natural inclinations; to work with thankfulness and joy, considering it an honor to employ and develop by means of labor the gifts received from God; to work with order, peace, moderation, and patience, never shrinking from weariness and trials; to work above all with purity of intention and detachment from self, keeping unceasingly before my eyes death and the account that I must give of time lost, talents unused, goods omitted, and vain complacency in success, so fatal to the work of God. All for Jesus, all through Mary, all after thy example, O Patriarch, St. Joseph. Such shall be my watchword in life and in death. Amen."
- 5. Dedicate every Wednesday to his chaste heart.—The Catholic Church traditionally dedicates Wednesday to St. Joseph. Whether it involves praying the Litany to St. Joseph or attending daily Mass, set aside time for prayer and reflection every Wednesday this month. Although the Church does not have an official "First Wednesday" devotion, you can make the Nine First Wednesdays in a manner similar to the Nine First Fridays of the Sacred Heart or the Five First Saturdays to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. Devotion to the Most Chaste Heart of St. Joseph is celebrated on the First Wednesday of each month based on apparitions approved by Bishop Dom Carillo Gritti in 2010.
- 6. Consecrate yourself or your family to St. Joseph.—More recently, Fr Donald Calloway, MIC, popularized this spiritual practice. In a previous interview with *ChurchPOP*, Fr Calloway explained it as, "...entrusting our lives into the hands of our Spiritual Father, so that he, with Our Lady, can help us grow in holiness. And I think now is the time for this." Check out our reporting on Fr Donald Calloway's book, *Consecration to St. Joseph: The Wonders of Our Spiritual Father*.


