

### REFLECT AND RESPOND

## Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord

FIRST READING (ACTS 10:34A, 37-43)

In his speech, Peter places much emphasis on his personal witness to the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. To whom this week could you witness your faith in the resurrection of Jesus?

### SECOND READING (COL 3:1-4 OR 1 COR 5:6B-8)

Paul taught the believers in Colossae to anticipate the return of the resurrected Jesus. How does your family celebrate Easter Sunday?

#### GOSPEL (JN 20:1-9 OR MK 16:1-7)

Mary Magdala, Peter, and the Beloved Disciple were the first to experience the joy and mystery of the empty tomb. Do you recall when you first started believing in the resurrection of Jesus?

### GOSPEL MEDITATION



Outside Chicago, there is a small cemetery in the woods behind Mundelein Seminary, where I was a student. One night I was exploring it. I looked up and was shocked to see an imposing seventeen-foot angel towering over me and preparing to blow a trumpet. Adrenaline rushed through me. I gasped and uttered, "Oh my God!" Quickly I realized it was in fact a massive bronze statue. I tried to calm myself down. But it still freaked me out.

As we begin to celebrate Easter today, this image might seem a bit unnerving. But please recall that for the first disciples on

the morning of the resurrection, it was precisely that. It wasn't joyful at first, it was terrifying. It wasn't peaceful, it was unsettling. In that Jerusalem cemetery, something otherworldly had happened. Angels announced that he was no longer dead, but alive. They had blown their trumpets, so to speak, and Jesus had risen. Soon the disciples' shock in that dark cemetery would turn into joy.

We all have our own places of the dead, too, don't we? Deceased loved ones. Our tired patterns of blame. Relationships stuck in resentment. Indifference to the poor. Lost dreams. Despair about our future. Fear of sickness and death. These are our "cemeteries" where we don't expect much to happen. Today we enter—if we dare—those places with the disciples. See the mighty angel standing there, trumpet ready to blare!

## CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

#### QUESTION:

What is spiritual communion, and do you need to be in a state of grace to receive it?

### ANSWER:

The practice of making a "spiritual communion" dates back several centuries and St. Thomas Aquinas described it as "an ardent desire to receive Jesus in the Holy Sacrament



and a loving embrace as though we had already received Him." Traditionally, a prayer of spiritual communion has been used by those who are unable to receive sacramental communion because of health, inability to attend Mass, or who cannot receive communion because of grave sin. This practice has been encouraged by many saints and spiritual writers and most recently Pope Francis encouraged the practice when the realities of the COVID-19 pandemic prevented so many Catholics from taking part in the Mass or receiving sacramental communion.

Although the graces offered in spiritual communion are not the same as those offered in the sacramental communion of the Mass, this practice is still a powerful opportunity to express our desire for union with the Lord and to be united with Christ and the Church, even in an imperfect way.

# SAINT BENJAMIN Deacon and Martyr



St. Benjamin (d. 424 A.D.) was a deacon martyred in Persia during a forty-year-long Christian persecution under two tyrannical Persian kings. He was imprisoned for a year due to his Christian faith and then released with the help of the Eastern Roman Emperor Theodosius II. As a condition of his release he was ordered to no longer publicly proclaim his faith. Benjamin declared that it was his duty to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ and he refused to be silenced. He continued preaching Christ crucified, and,

when word reached the king, he was arrested again. In response, Benjamin asked the king what opinion he would have of any of his subjects if they were to renounce their allegiance to the king and join in war against him; in the same way Benjamin could not renounce his allegiance to Christ. This comment enraged the king, and he ordered Benjamin to endure cruel tortures. Sharpened reeds were repeatedly jammed underneath his fingernails, toenails, and other tender parts of the body. He died when a knotted stake was jammed into his bowels. St. Benjamin's feast day is celebrated on March 31.

# BLESSSED ANACLETO GONZALEZ FLORES Martyr

Bl. Anacleto Gonzalez Flores (1888–1927) was the second of twelve children born to a poor family in Jalisco, Mexico. He was baptized the day after his birth. As he grew, a priest recognized his intelligence and recommended that he enter the seminary. Anacleto studied there for a time before discerning that he was not called to the priesthood. Instead he became an attorney, husband, and father, as well as an activist for his Catholic faith. He was a prolific writer and dedicated catechism teacher, and attended



daily Mass. He joined the Catholic Association of Young Mexicans (ACJM) in addition to starting another Catholic lay organization committed to resisting the fierce persecution of the Catholic Church under the infamous Mexican dictator, Calles. Initially he participated only in the non-violent resistance against Calles, until four members of the ACJM were murdered in 1926. Their deaths spurred Anacleto to lend support to the armed resistance movement. Anacleto did not take up arms but instead gave speeches to encourage Catholics to support the Cristeros, the Catholic army fighting against Calles. Anacleto was captured during the Cristero War on April 1, 1927, and was brutally tortured before being martyred by firing squad. His feast day is April 1.

# VENERALBE FRANCIS-XAVIER NGUYỄN VĂN THUẬN Priest



Venerable Francis-Xavier Nguyễn Văn Thuận, (1928 –2002) was born in Huế, Vietnam and was the nephew of South Vietnam's first president. He entered seminary when he was a teenager and was ordained in 1953 at age 25. By 1975 he was appointed as the coadjutor archbishop of Saigon, just as the Vietnam War came to an end. Only six days after his appointment, Saigon fell to the North Vietnamese Army and Francis-Xavier, targeted for his faith and connections, was arrested, and detained by the regime. For the next 13 years, he endured immense hardships in captivity, including nine years of solitary confinement. Throughout his imprisonment,

Francis-Xavier's devotion to Jesus sustained him. Denied access to the Mass and to the Sacraments, he secretly celebrated Mass while confined with whatever resources he could find—even if he only had a few drops of wine and a piece of bread as the elements for the Eucharist. While imprisoned, he became known for his joyful spirit, sharing hope and encouragement with fellow prisoners, and writing powerful faith reflections on scraps of paper, which were smuggled out and circulated among Catholics worldwide. Released from prison in 1988, Francis-Xavier continued to inspire the Church from house arrest as well as from exile in Switzerland. In 1994, Pope John Paul II appointed him as the president of the Pontifical Council for Justice and Peace, recognizing his dedication to promoting peace, reconciliation, and social justice. Fourteen years later he died of cancer in Rome at the age of 74. In recognition of his heroic virtues, Francis-Xavier Nguyễn Văn Thuận was declared Venerable by Pope Francis in 2017. His cause for beatification is ongoing, and he continues to be an important figure for those facing oppression and adversity, inspiring them to remain steadfast in God's love. 

# DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY, APRIL 7 Enthrone Your Home

"I desire that this image be venerated, first in your chapel, and then throughout the world. I promise that the soul that will venerate this image will not perish. By means of this image I shall be granting many graces to souls: so, let every soul have access to it." (Jesus to St. Faustina, Diary, 47, 48, 570)

The Enthronement of the Divine Mercy image in the home is the recognition and honoring of the existence of God our Creator by the family. Those who give themselves to trusting in the wonderful love and mercy that His Son, Jesus, brings to us through this image. This image which was first made known to Saint Maria Faustina Kowalska in 1931.



Pick up your own copy of the Divine Mercy image and a prayer card to pray the Chaplet of Divine Mercy in the narthex.

The enthronement begins by installing the Divine Image in a place of honor in the home, which is then ceremoniously blessed by a priest or deacon if available or the head of the household as follows:

#### THE BLESSING

- V: Our help is in the name of the Lord
- R: Who made Heaven and Earth
- V: The Lord be with you
- R: And also with you

Let us pray. Almighty, Eternal God, you have allowed pictures and statues of your saints to be painted and carved, so that as often as we look upon them with our bodily eyes, we may recall with our more inward eyes their deeds and their sanctity and learn to imitate them. In your goodness, therefore, bless and sanctify this picture fashioned to reveal to us the unfathomable love of our crucified and risen Savior—Divine Mercy personified—and to recall to our minds the streams of blood and water gushing forth from His Pierced Heart to be a fount of mercy for us. Grant to all who invoke your mercy with this picture before their eyes, the grace of true repentance, pardon, and peace. Shield them from every danger to soul and body. Loving Savior, establish in this picture the throne of your mercy. Pour out upon all who approach it with faith and trust, the purifying, healing, and sanctifying rays of grace ever emanating from it as from a blazing sun. Gaze upon them from it as you did from the cross with unfathomable love and compassion. Through this image may your Divine Mercy triumph over all the powers and wiles of Satan the world over. May all who venerate it never perish. May it be their joy in life, their hope in death, and their glory in eternity. This we ask through Christ Our Lord, Amen.

## **FASTING VS. FEASTING** It's Improper to Fast on Easter

"In giving us this regular hunger for food, we are also given opportunity to sacrifice for each other and for God and to discipline our appetites. Always cognizant of our nature, the liturgical year is rife with periods of both fasting and feast. In order to feast, we



must also know sacrifice; in fact, it's only in sacrifice that we understand what a feast really is. Our lives can contain an ever-repeating rhythm of each in its proper time. In the same way that it would be profane to feast on Good Friday, so would it be improper to fast on Easter. This rhythm is a reminder of both a need to be filled as well as a need to strengthen our resolve so that we might long first and foremost for the feast that has no end."



# WHY IS EASTER ALSO CALLED "PASCHA"? The Connection Between the Jewish Passover and Easter

"Pascha" means "Passover"—it is the Aramaic form of Hebrew's Pesach, the feast commemorating Israel's release from bondage in Egypt. Calling Easter "Pascha" brings home the reality of Christ as the Paschal Lamb. At Passover, God commanded the Israelites to sacrifice a pure lamb and mark their doorposts with its blood. Seeing the lamb's blood, the angel of death would skip their homes as he went throughout Egypt, slaying every firstborn male among man and beast. At Easter, Christ allowed Himself to be crucified and His Blood poured out. His Blood redeems us from eternal death, setting us apart from those who reject Him. It's no coincidence that this event occurred during the Passover feast. "The connection between the Jewish Passover and the Christian feast of Easter is real and ideal. Real, since Christ died on the first Jewish Easter Day; ideal...because Christ's death and Resurrection had its

figures and types in the Old Law, particularly in the paschal lamb, which was eaten towards evening of the 14th of Nisan," *The Catholic Encyclopedia*.

Easter, prefigured by the Passover, becomes a reality. Passover is fulfilled. Christ is the Paschal Lamb. We are the Israelites. His triumph over death releases us from the slavery of sin. We are freed to set out for the Promised Land—for Heaven. Easter is steeped in many symbolic connections. Christ's Resurrection and Last Supper as well as His death sprang firmly from Jewish roots. In the fascinating pages of *Jesus and the Jewish Roots of the Eucharist*, Dr. Brant Pitre explains the Last Supper in light of the Jewish Passover meal. You'll find fascinating answers to all the questions you have about the institution of the Eucharist and the Last Supper.

# WOMAN CONVERTS TO CATHOLISIM After Praying "Hail Mary" Every Day for Three Years

"By this devotion, we give to Jesus all we can possibly give Him, and in the most perfect manner, that is, through Mary's hands," St. Louis de Montfort.

Last week a woman took to X (formerly Twitter) to share her conversion story. She explains that during college in 1993, her Italian boyfriend taught her the "Hail Mary". She wrote down the prayer in her journal and recited it daily in Italian. Three years later, she converted to Catholicism. "It never occurred to me at the time that those actions were connected," she said. "Now, I'm certain they were."



Other X users commented with supportive kind sentiments and similar testimonies to the rosary. One user said, "I came back to the Church shortly after starting to pray the Rosary. It's always Mary who draws us to Jesus." Another user said, "One of the joys of getting older is looking back and connecting the dots of events that in fact were Jesus and our Blessed Mother working in our [lives]." One user added, "God bless you and welcome home."

There are countless conversion stories throughout the world that include Mary at the helm, but what is it about Mary that is so intriguing and ultimately leads people to Jesus? We learn in the Gospel of John (John 19: 26-27) that while Jesus was dying for our sins and giving us salvation, He also gave us an irreplaceable gift. In His goodness, the Lord offers His mother to all of mankind. "When Jesus saw His mother and the disciple there whom He loved, He said to His mother, 'Woman, behold, your son.' Then He said to the disciple, 'Behold, your mother.' And from that hour the disciple took her into his home."

The Blessed Mother has the ultimate goal for each of us: to devote ourselves to her son so we can get to Heaven. In the way we ask our friends and family to pray for us, there is much power in asking the Blessed Mother to do the same. The "Hail Mary" is the most perfect example of where true motherly love and intercessory prayer meet. We are offered an open invitation to accept the motherhood of Mary into our personal lives. Let it start with one "Hail Mary" and see how the Blessed Mother softens your heart to do the will of Her Son. As St. Josemaría Escrivá wrote, "If you seek Mary, you will find Jesus."

But those prayers only scratch the surface! How many prayers do we actually know by



heart? Likely fewer than we think. CatholicVote has compiled a list of prayers you may be familiar with but not really know. We challenge you to memorize these prayers as we all strive to pray without ceasing.

THE 'MEMORARE'—Remember, O most gracious Virgin Mary, that never was it known that anyone who fled to thy protection, implored thy help, or sought thine intercession was left unaided. Inspired by this confidence, I fly unto thee, O Virgin of virgins, my mother; to thee do I come, before thee I stand, sinful and sorrowful. O Mother of the Word Incarnate, despise not my petitions, but in thy mercy hear and answer me. Amen.

THE JESUS PRAYER—Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy upon me, a sinner. Amen.

MORNING OFFERING—O Jesus, through the Immaculate Heart of Mary, I offer you my prayers, works, joys, and sufferings of this day, in union with the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass throughout the world. I offer them for all the intentions of your Sacred Heart; the salvation of souls, reparation for sin, the reunion of Christians; and in particular for the intentions of the Holy Father. Amen.

ST. MICHAEL PRAYER—St. Michael the Archangel, defend us in battle, be our protection against the wickedness and snares of the devil. May God rebuke him we humbly pray; and do thou, O Prince of the Heavenly host, by the power of God, cast into hell Satan and all the evil spirits who prowl about the world seeking the ruin of souls. Amen.

ETERNAL REST—Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in peace. Amen.

HAIL HOLY QUEEN—Hail, holy Queen, Mother of Mercy, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve. To thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this valley of tears. Turn, then, most gracious advocate, thine eyes of mercy toward us; and after this, our exile, show unto us the blessed fruit of thy womb, Jesus. O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary. Pray for us, O most holy Mother of God, that we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ. Amen.

ANIMA CHRISTI—Soul of Christ, sanctify me. Body of Christ, save me. Blood of Christ, inebriate me. Water from the side of Christ, wash me. Passion of Christ, strengthen me. O good Jesus, hear me. Within your wounds hide me. Never permit me to be parted from you. From the evil enemy defend me. At the hour of my death call me and bid me come to you, that with your saints I may praise you for age upon age. Amen.

NICENE CREED—I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of Heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible. I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through Him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation He came down from Heaven, and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man. For our sake He was crucified under Pontius Pilate, He suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into Heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and His Kingdom will have no end. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. I believe in one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.

APOSTLES' CREED—I believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of Heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried; He descended into hell; on the third day He rose again from the dead; He ascended into Heaven, and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty; from there He will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. Amen.


