

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE

REFLECT AND RESPOND

4th Sunday of Easter

FIRST READING (ACTS 4:8-12)

Peter bore witness to the Sanhedrin that it was the crucified and risen Jesus who healed the crippled man and through whom we are saved. Have you ever told someone else about your faith in Jesus?

SECOND READING (JN 3:1-2)

John tells us that as believers we are destined one day to be like the resurrected and glorified Jesus. How do you think we can best prepare for such a future?

GOSPEL (JN 10:11-18)

As the "Good Shepherd," Jesus speaks of the power given to Him by the Father to lay down His life for His sheep. What could you do this week for the benefit of another?

GOSPEL MEDITATION



Recently I was with my little dog Libby at a retreat center in the Arizona desert. I sat in a chair near a ravine filled with shrubs. Unbeknownst to me, Libby wandered down there and disappeared. Suddenly an animal's wild shriek erupted from the area. Without thinking, I bolted down into the ravine fully expecting to see coyotes, javelinas, or rattlesnakes. I didn't care. I desperately wanted to get Libby out of there, without any self-regard. Before I could face whatever danger lay hidden, my dog blissfully trotted out from an entirely different area, utterly unaware that I had (quite heroically) just placed my life on the line.

When the adrenaline wore off, I thought to myself: how far would I have been willing to go to save her? I don't know. But I do know, if I had literally died, my friends and family would have certainly thought me insane for dying for a dog. No offense, Libby.

How passionately Jesus wants us to know Him and His willingness to die for us! This week He says, "I know my own and my own know me," and "I lay down my life for the sheep." Here we encounter an insanely excessive love for us. Christianity is a relationship and not simply a religion or ethical code. In Jesus, God rescues and saves us. He laid down His life for you and me—and He has taken it up again. So often we are like Libby—blissfully ignorant of the reality of both our spiritual danger and His saving love. This Easter season, the risen Jesus calls us to be more conscious than ever before about His love. He never ceases to lay down His life for us.

CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

QUESTION:

What is unique or different about the way Catholics read and are exposed to the Bible?

ANSWER:

Catholics are exposed to Scripture primarily through the Sunday readings from a book known as the Lectionary. The Lectionary is a book of selected passages from the Bible set in the context of a liturgical season, such as Advent, Lent, or Ordinary Time. There




are four readings assigned to any Sunday: the first reading (usually from the Old Testament), the responsorial psalm, the second reading (usually from a New Testament letter), and the Gospel reading.

These readings together give them a new context. The selected readings relate to one another in a unique manner that is not present in the Bible text itself. In close proximity to each other, these readings now have the opportunity to converse with each other in a way that would have not been possible before. A homilist pays attention to all four readings, preparing a reflection that speaks of this conversation among the readings, enabling us to zero in on what this unique combination of God's Word has to say to us this particular Sunday.

Next time you attend Sunday Mass, try reading the Scripture ahead of time and see how this new relationship among the readings addresses and challenges you to be a better Christian here and now.

Dear Lord, you are my shepherd, the Good Shepherd, who leads in ways beyond my understanding. Guide me in the paths you would have me go. Amen.

SAINT SOTER Pope



Pope St. Soter (c. 174-175 A.D.) was born in Fondi, Italy. Nothing is known of his early life. He served as the 12th bishop of Rome from c.167 to 175 A.D. He was praised for his fatherly tenderness in comforting, both with words and generous alms, those who suffered for their Catholic faith, especially remote Christian churches living in poverty. He is said to have written an encyclical against Montanism—a heresy which maintained that a Christian who sinned gravely could never be redeemed. Pope St. Soter also declared that marriage was only a valid

sacrament when blessed by a priest. The manner of Pope St. Soter's death is uncertain; one tradition holds that he was martyred on April 22, 175 A.D., under the Christian persecution of Roman Emperor Marcus Aurelius. He was buried in Rome on the Appian Way in the catacombs of St. Callixtus. His feast day is April 22.

SAINT ZITA Religious

St. Zita (d. 1271) was born into poverty in Tuscany, Italy. Her mother taught her to develop a strong prayer life, which, combined with her happy disposition, enabled her to seek God's will in all her life circumstances. At the age of twelve she became a servant for a noble Italian family. The family she served lived near a church, and Zita would rise early to attend daily Mass before beginning her duties. She



saw her work as being in the service of God, which she executed with care and diligence. Because of her goodness she suffered harsh treatment and even physical abuse at the hands of both her employers and the other servants. From her patient endurance of such mistreatment, Zita's humility and virtue became evident to all. She was eventually respected and promoted to a leadership role of managing the entire household and its servants. Throughout her life she exemplified hard work, gentleness, and a life of prayer, despite being overworked. She died at the age of 60 serving the same family, and after her death many miracles occurred through her intercession. The family contributed to the cause for her canonization. St. Zita is an incorruptible, and her relics are kept in the Basilica of St. Frediano where she attended Mass. She is the patron saint of maids, domestic servants, butlers, waiters, rape victims, lost keys, and people ridiculed for their piety. St. Zita's feast day is April 27.

SAINT PASCHAL BAYLÓN Religious



St. Paschal Baylón (1540-1592) was born in Spain to impoverished Catholic parents. He worked alongside his father as a shepherd from his childhood until his 20's. He often prayed while working in the fields, listening daily for the church bells that would ring at the point of Elevation of the Eucharist during Mass to remind him to spend time with the Lord. He was known for his work ethic and honesty among his neighbors and desired a religious life from a young age. Baylón taught himself to read so he could pray the Little Office of the Blessed Virgin, a prayer popular in his time. He would give parts of his dinner away to

those in need when it was brought to him as he was shepherding in the field. He also had great compassion for the sick. At age 24, Baylón joined the Friars Minor and although invited to study to be a priest, he chose to be a brother. In this vocation he served his brothers in many ways, including as a chef, door man, gardener, and official beggar. As a Franciscan lay brother, he took a vow of poverty but remained generous to those poor who came begging at the monastery—to the point that the other friars sometimes tried to limit his giving. St. Paschal found particular solace while praying before the Blessed Sacrament. His devotion to Christ in the Eucharist was tangible as he was known to spend most of his free time in adoration and would occasionally experience visions after all-night prayer. Because of this devotion, he is the Patron Saint of Eucharistic Congresses and Societies. He was also known widely for his spiritual council. People all over the region would visit him to talk about faith and life. St. Paschal Baylón, pray for us!



NEBRASKA CATHOLIC DAY OF GIVING—MAY 1 Donate Now!





The Archdiocese of Omaha, the Diocese of Lincoln, and the Diocese of Grand Island are joining together to offer the first ever Nebraska Catholic Day of Giving on Wednesday, May 1.

St. Patrick parish will use the money raised during this event to fund the building

projects around the Church including updating the lights in the Sanctuary, the restoration of the rose stained glass windows, and replacing the carpet in various places. Any donation amount is helpful to cover the costs of repairs and preventative maintenance of our beloved church building. We thank you for generosity, support, and stewardship!

BREAK DOWN OF COST

Updating the Sanctuary Lights—Our dimming system for the lights in the Church is outdated and needs to be replaced along with the light fixtures. In total an estimated cost of: \$83.500.

Restoring the Rose Stained Glass Windows—Overtime time, the window frames of the north and south rose windows have degraded and need to be restored. The south rose window in the old part of the church has been estimated to cost \$29,000 to restore, and the north rose window is estimated to cost \$23,900. In total an estimated cost of: \$52,900.

Replacing the Carpet—There are several areas in the building that could use new carpet as it is worn and aged. Areas include the narthex, the stairway, the Basement Commons area, the Youth Group Room, the Basement Rehearsal Room, and three of the classrooms in the basement. In total an estimated cost of: \$51,388.



WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS Sunday, April 21

As Catholics, we firmly believe that God has a plan for our lives! He calls some to marriage, some to the priesthood, and others to religious life or to live as generous single people. Fully living our own vocations—and teaching young people how to discern God's call—is a serious duty, but also a joyful one.





The Catholic University in Washington D.C. was founded in 1887 by American Bishops and is the only US university with Pontifical faculties. Finally, funds from this collection will support basic pastoral services in areas that struggle to provide such necessities on their own, local communities where Catholics are few, the church is fragile, and pastors struggle to keep mission parishes afloat.

HOW LONG IS THE EASTER SEASON

Much like Christmas, Easter is no "one-day" Feast



The Easter Octave concluded on Sunday April 7. But does our Easter celebration end there? Is it all over once the octave concludes? The resounding answer is: No! The season of Easter continues on for a full fifty days, up through the feast of Pentecost (which is May 19 this year). Easter is the most important feast in the liturgical calendar, and it only makes sense that the Church should celebrate not just a feast, not just an octave, but a whole season in honor of Our Lord's Resurrection. Within these

fifty days we celebrate some important feasts: Divine Mercy Sunday, the Feast of the Ascension (in most places, the Sunday before Pentecost, but in our diocese we celebrate it on Thursday, May 9 this year—a Holy Day of Obligation), and finally, Pentecost itself, the birthday of the Church! So don't wind down your celebrations yet. We've got four weeks of joy ahead of us.

WHAT IS A HERMIT? Weren't They Just a Medieval Phenomenon Long Ago?

A hermit is a person who lives alone, devoting himself to prayer and meditation. Old Testament figures such as Elijah and John the Baptist were hermits—they withdrew to the desert to fast, pray, and be alone with God. The word "hermit" comes from the Greek eremites, literally "a dweller in the desert," because those living alone in this way invariably went to the desert. While this withdrawal from the world might seem like a misanthropic renunciation of normal life, the motive of Catholic hermits is quite the reverse. Hermits love mankind so much, and are so



repentant for the sins of our nature, that they desire to devote their whole lives to praying for God's mercy and grace upon themselves and their fellow-men. The first known hermits in the Catholic Church were St. Paul of Thebes and St. Anthony the Great, both of whom lived in the 3rd century A.D. They fled persecution on the one hand and worldliness on the other, living undistracted in the desert. Despite the privacy afforded by their wild surroundings, they became famous among Christians and were sought out by followers, whose numbers grew steadily. These followers adhered to and passed on the ascetic lifestyle of these holy hermits.

From the Eastern deserts, this way of life spread to the West. Hermits gradually joined together and formed monastic communities such as we are familiar with today. Now, many hermits live in community, coming together for Mass and the Liturgy of the Hours, but living in separate houses and working in solitude. Carthusians and some Carmelites, for example, live according to this eremitical rule. Hermits such as Paul and Anthony are not common, but on occasion some great and unique soul is called to this total abandonment of the world. St. Charles de Foucauld was one of these souls—and he lived quite near to our own time! BRING 'EM BACK! PART 1

Series in Conversations to Bring Lapsed Catholics Back

Do you have a Catholic loved one or friend who is no longer a 'practicing' Catholic? This is the first in a series of 15 articles aimed at helping you to get your lapsed Catholic loved going to Church again and once again practicing his or her Catholic Faith.

In 2017, according to various surveys, some 56 million out of 70 million Catholics in the U.S. were not going to Mass every week. And this was prior to the COVID-



19 outbreak. Flip those numbers. Just 14 million out of 70 million U.S. Catholics were regularly attending Mass on Saturday/Sunday prior to COVID. Thanks to the outbreak, however, our churches were pretty much closed and our Bishops dispensed Catholics from attending Mass altogether. The more devout Catholics took to watching live streamed Masses online during the outbreak. But for the millions of 'lapsed Catholics,' the other activities they had already chosen over keeping the Lord's Day holy just continued as usual. So what happened post-COVID? Villanova University's Center for Church Management, projected that post-Covid regular attendance at Saturday/Sunday Mass could fall to just 12 percent of U.S. Catholics. So instead of 14 million U.S. Catholics regularly going to Mass each week, just 8.4 million U.S. Catholics would be going to Mass every week.

MORE LAPSED CATHOLICS

The Archdiocese of Detroit lifted Mass dispensations on March 13, 2021. Yet from what I've seen in my parish, a sizeable number of Catholics still have not returned to Mass. I estimate that Mass attendance at the Saturday evening and Sunday Masses in my parish is easily off by at least one-third, post-Covid. If the Villanova projections are correct, and it looks like they may be, this would mean 61.6 million out of 70 million Catholics in the U.S. are no longer going to Mass on Saturday/Sunday. (So instead of 14 million Catholics regularly attending Mass on Saturday/Sunday, only 8.4 million may now be regularly attending Mass.) And if 61.6 million Catholics are voluntarily breaking the third Commandment every week, it's a pretty safe bet that that are no longer practicing other tenets of their Faith. The devil must be doing handsprings and jumping for joy.

We need to get our lapsed Catholic friends and loved ones going to Mass again as the first step in bringing them back into the Church. Their immortal souls are in jeopardy. We need to help all the lapsed Catholics out there to realize that going to Mass every week is not just a suggestion. It is how we keep the third Commandment. It is how we keep the Lord's day Holy. But what these lapsed Catholics may not realize is that by not going to Mass they may also be breaking the first Commandment. When someone chooses to sleep in, go golfing, go shopping, etc., instead of going to Mass they may be creating a false god. They are making that activity (or their own desires) more important than worshipping God.

BRING 'EM BACK

The chances are pretty good that you have a Catholic friend or family member (probably more than one) who has stopped going to Mass on Sunday. Perhaps you have a son or daughter who has stopped going to Mass. You may even have aunts, uncles, cousins, daughters-in-law, or sons-in-law who no longer go to Mass. You may be praying for them, but you may also be wondering if there is anything you can do to get them to go to Mass again. There is. Prayer and setting a good example are always good practices. But a talk, or even a series of talks with your lapsed Catholic loved one may be just the ticket to getting them turned around. An old truism is 'never discuss religion or politics at family gatherings.' And there's a good reason for this. Such discussions at family gatherings can easily turn into heated disagreements. People take sides, feelings get hurt, and family members sometimes end up not talking to one another. But this does not mean 'never discuss religion or politics one-on-one.' Some people, however, may stress over the thought of having a one-on-one talk with a lapsed Catholic loved one or friend. But it does not have to be a stressful experience. All it takes is preparation. Preparation enables charitable responses to the different excuses offered up as 'reasons' why your friend or loved one has stopped going to Mass.

A PLAN

This article is the first in a series of 15 articles. The goal of the articles is to help you have a discussion, or a series of discussions with your lapsed Catholic loved one(s) and friends. The articles will offer a strategy—a plan for making the conversations non-stressful, non-threatening conversations. Hopefully the conversations will result in your friend or loved one deciding to start going to Mass regularly and living his or her faith once more. This series of articles will run every Monday for the next 14 weeks. Copying and pasting the articles will give you a free eBook that just may be the roadmap for helping your lapsed-Catholic friends and loved ones find their way back to practicing their faith.
