

REFLECT AND RESPOND

5th Sunday of Easter

FIRST READING (ACTS 9:26-31)

The disciples were unwilling to trust that Saul (Paul) was a true believer until Barnabas offered support for Saul. How easily do you trust people you don't know well?

SECOND READING (1 JN 3:18-24)

John speaks of the importance of knowing in your heart that you believe in Jesus and truly love others. How does anyone know what is in their heart?

GOSPEL (JN 15:1-8)

Using the metaphor of a vine and branches, Jesus speaks of the importance of staying connected to Him and the Father. When do you feel close to Jesus?

GOSPEL MEDITATION



My friend and fellow pastor, Father Paul, noticed unsightly, overgrown trees near his parish church. He asked the maintenance crew to cut back the growth, which they happily did, telling him the trees would be much healthier and even fuller after a good pruning. A few days later, Father Paul received a letter from an irate man in the neighborhood who wrote, "Jesus would never prune trees like that. He loves trees, unlike you."

I suspect that the neighbor was not familiar with this week's Gospel in which Jesus says of his Father, "He removes every

branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit He prunes to make it bear more fruit" (John 15:2) I don't mean to pick too much on that fellow. He was perhaps ignorant of arboriculture. But I'd wager his main confusion was the pruning and removing quality of God's love. That confusion afflicts us all to some degree, doesn't it? It is just so darn easy to react negatively when God cuts something out of our lives and assume it's not His work at all. In the moment, all we see is the loss, and not the loving desire for future flourishing.

The cross is the great pruning of Christ's body. Jesus' rising is the brand-new growth. It is God's promise to us that all the painful pruning in life is leading us somewhere beautiful. What has been cut back or out in your life? A friend, an opportunity, a sense of certainty, a job, health, a relationship? This week, offer those dry branches to the one who lovingly prunes us in order to make our lives burst with verdant growth.

CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

QUESTION:

How does a person become a canonized saint?

ANSWER


It is important to remember that all the saints are people, real people who lived just as we do! The first saints of the Church were martyrs or theologians known for a holy life. Over time, the Church has established a set process to investigate the causes of saints.

After a holy person's death, the bishop of their diocese initiates the canonization process with the Vatican. Typically, they must wait five years to ensure any false enthusiasm has lessened. With Vatican approval, the process begins and the person receives the title "Servant of God." The first phase involves collecting information about the



person's life and scrutinizing it carefully. One person has the specific role of raising doubts—this is the origin of the phrase "devil's advocate!" When it is clear the person truly lived a heroically holy life according to Church teaching, they are declared "Venerable."

If the person is a martyr for the faith, they will also be declared "Blessed." If the person is not a martyr, they must be credited with a miracle. This is also closely examined for authenticity. Once the miracle is authenticated as truly a miracle performed by God through the person or through their intercession, they are beatified. An additional authenticated miracle is required before canonization, and we can call them "Saint."

SAINT LOUIS-MARIE GRIGNION DE MONTFORT Priest




St. Louis-Marie Grignion de Montfort (1673-1716) was born in Brittany, France, to a large farming family. As a child he displayed an unusual spiritual maturity and spent much time in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament. At the age of 19 he went on foot to Paris to study theology at a prestigious school with the support of a benefactor; along the way he gave his possessions to the poor and made a lifelong vow to live in poverty supported entirely on alms. He was ordained a priest

at the age of 27, and at 32 discovered his calling to be an itinerant preacher, receiving the title of "Apostolic Missionary" from the Pope after his bishop tried to silence him. For the next 17 years he preached missions in countless towns and villages throughout France with an emphasis on renewal and reform. His fiery devotion, oratory skill, and identification with the poor led many souls to conversion. He was persecuted by the Jansenists, who, in their spiritual pride, poisoned him, banished him from preaching in their dioceses, and made an assassination attempt on his life. He had a profound devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary and taught on the power of the Holy Rosary. He also wrote a number of classic works on Marian devotion, the most famous being *True Devotion to Mary*. His feast day is April 28.


SAINT ATHANASIUS Bishop and Doctor of the Church

St. Athanasius (296-373 A.D.) was born in Alexandria, Egypt, to noble Christian parents. He received an excellent education in theology, philosophy, rhetoric, and law, which he directed to the service of God. He made great progress in both wisdom and virtue, and made a spiritual retreat in the Egyptian desert with St. Anthony the Great. St. Athanasius became the Bishop of Alexandria and served in that role for 46 years. He tirelessly and courageously devoted most of his



life to defeating the Arian heresy, which denied the divinity of Christ. When the majority of his fellow bishops were Arian heretics, which threatened the integrity of the whole Church, Athanasius stood firmly and almost single-handedly against their error using his philosophical knowledge, theological wisdom, rhetorical skill, and strength of spirit. Despite having the support of several popes, he suffered great trials, scandals, and persecutions at the hands of his doctrinal enemies, and spent much of his life in exile. He was a participant in the Council of Nicea in 325 A.D. and did much of the theological work which supported the condemnation of the Arian heresy and the formulation of the Nicene Creed. St. Athanasius is known as one of the greatest champions of Catholic doctrine to have ever lived, earning the title, "Father of Orthodoxy." St. Athanasius was later declared a Doctor of the Church. His feast day is celebrated on May 2.

SAINT TERESA OF JESUS OF THE ANDES Religious



St. Teresa of Jesus of the Andes (1900-1920) was born Juana Enriqueta Josefina of the Sacred Hearts Fernandez Solar. Her family and friends nicknamed her Juanita. As a youth she read a biography of St. Thérèse of Lisieux that inspired her to grow in her faith and choose a path in life that led toward a religious vocation. By the age of 14 she knew she wanted to consecrate herself as a religious Carmelite nun. At the age of 19, she began her novitiate with Carmelites and took the name "Teresa of Jesus." She was particularly drawn to the religious life with the Carmelites because she enjoyed the simple life offered in the

convent, the companionship of the other sisters living and serving Jesus alongside her. She also found joy in her proximity to the Blessed Sacrament where she would often be found in prayer. During her short time with the Carmelites before her death, she wrote many letters to friends, family, and other community members. She considered these letters her apostolate and shared her thoughts as well as spiritual encouragement with those with whom she corresponded. Her writings frequently focused on her experiences of and thoughts on living a fulfilling spiritual life. After a particularly violent attack of typhus, she was permitted to take her vows early because it was feared she would die. After her vows and receiving her last rites, she succumbed to the disease just three months before her twentieth birthday. St. Teresa of Jesus of the Andes's short yet faith-filled life stands as a lasting testament to believers everywhere that one's life doesn't have to be long and filled with lofty accomplishments to be an amazing example of faith and Christ's love.





HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS COLLECTION This Weekend—April 27-28

This weekend we will have a second collection for Home and Foreign Missions. The proceeds will be divided between four different missions, Latin America, the Holy Land, Catholic University, and Home Missions. Please be generous to support these missions.



For almost forty years the Church in the US has been actively assisting the Church in Latin America. Grants are made to support the vast needs of the local churches especially in the areas of evangelization, pastoral programs and formation of laity, religious and seminarians. The funds raised for the Holy Land will go toward the care and maintenance of the Holy Sites. The Catholic University in Washington D.C. was founded in 1887 by American Bishops and is the only US university with Pontifical faculties. Funds will provide academic scholarships to Catholic University of America. Finally, funds from this collection will support basic pastoral services in areas that struggle to provide such necessities on their own, local communities where Catholics are few, the church is fragile, and pastors struggle to keep mission parishes afloat.



The Archdiocese of Omaha, the Diocese of Lincoln, and the Diocese of Grand Island are joining together to offer the first ever Nebraska Catholic Day of Giving on Wednesday, May 1.

St. Patrick parish will use the money raised during this event to fund the building projects around the Church including updating the lights in the Sanctuary, the restoration of the rose stained glass windows, and replacing the carpet in various places. Any donation amount is helpful to cover the costs of repairs and preventative maintenance of our beloved church building. We thank you for generosity, support, and stewardship!

BREAK DOWN OF COST

Updating the Sanctuary Lights—Our dimming system for the lights in the Church is outdated and needs to be replaced along with the light fixtures. In total an estimated cost of: \$83,500.

Restoring the Rose Stained Glass Windows-

Overtime time, the window frames of the north and south rose windows have degraded and need to be restored. The south rose window in the old part of the church has been estimated to cost \$29,000 to restore, and the north rose window is estimated to cost \$23,900. In total an estimated cost of: \$52,900.

Replacing the Carpet—There are several areas in the building that could use new carpet as it is worn and aged. Areas include the narthex, the stairway, the Basement Commons area, the Youth Group Room, the Basement Rehearsal Room, and three of the classrooms in the basement. In total an estimated cost of: \$51,388.

WHAT IS AN AUXILIARY BISHOP? How is His Role Different From a Regular Bishop?



None will deny the challenges faced by today's diocesan bishops. These include the size of the dioceses they govern, the number of the faithful they must serve, the complex ethnic composition of many dioceses, etc. As a result, when a bishop feels he requires assistance in his duties, he may ask the Holy See to appoint an auxiliary to lend a hand in the

administration of certain diocesan affairs. The auxiliary does not enjoy the right to succeed the bishop as ordinary in the diocese.

However, when a bishop must serve on national or international committees, tasks requiring significant time away from his diocese, or when advanced age or poor health interfere with his efficiently exercising his office, the Holy See may appoint an coadjutor bishop. The difference between a coadjutor and an auxiliary is the coadjutor enjoys the right to assume leadership of the diocese when the presiding bishop dies or resigns his office.

In the ranking of diocesan officials, the bishop enjoys the highest status, and a coadjutor the next, followed by any auxiliary bishops. The Church's Code of Canon Law observes they "are to consult one another on matters of major importance" (Canon 407.3).

MELODIOUS WAY TO CELEBRATE THE EASTER SEASON More Resounding Way to Rejoice

Just adding back what I gave up for Lent doesn't seem like enough of an Easter celebration, so I have come up with a more resounding way to rejoice. "No, love, we can't today—it's Lent! Ask me again when it's Eastertime!" That was my response to questions like, "Mom, let's buy a chocolate chip cookie!" "Mom, let's get some ice cream!" "Mom, can we have dessert?" These pleas and many similar ones have filled the air for



the last 40 days. Now that He is risen, we will enjoy some fun, "just because" treats in our house. But there are more ways to rejoice this Easter season than just enjoying dessert.

The Easter season lasts 50 days—even longer than Lent. Lent is such a good opportunity for spiritual growth, but I've always felt a little unsure of how to celebrate the Easter season. It definitely feels celebratory to add back into my day the things I had removed during Lent (hello second and third cups of tea!). Just adding back what was normal before doesn't seem like enough of a celebration, however. And eating extra sugar or special food and drink seems less than healthy or good for practicing habits of moderation and self-control.

TIME TO REJOICE AND SING

Here's my compromise. I try to pick one small practice to add to my day during the Easter season that helps me rejoice. That might be adding 10 minutes of extra time sitting in the sun, investing in a nicer coffee or tea to savor in the mornings, or enjoying a longer shower than normal. One suggestion I always come back to though is singing more. It is very hard to sing when you're angry. I know I'm grumpy when I don't want to or "can't" sing. Forcing myself to sing can pull me right out of a funk into a better place. So, what better way to cultivate a spirit of Easter joy than by singing? Resolving to "sing more" is too vague of a statement, though. I have made many resolutions that went undone because they were not specific enough. (One Lent I considered "eating more foods I dislike" as a penance, but realized that resolution, as stated, would never happen. I had to give it more parameters, such as how often during a day, or exactly what foods I would add.)

SONGFUL SUGGESTIONS

To make the resolution to sing more concrete, try resolving to sing a particular song every day, or singing at a particular time of the day. (Note: if singing out loud makes you feel self -conscious, the car or the shower are fine places to sing!) Not all songs are equally uplifting and edifying though. I want my Easter season singing to help me grow spiritually, so I have to make sure the songs I choose truly help me rejoice and pray. Growing up we always sang the "Regina Coeli" before eating lunch. The "Regina Coeli" is a traditional Marian antiphon that is sung specifically during Easter. Or you might try singing your favorite hymn, praise and worship song, or a Psalm. Check out EveryPsalm (everypsalm.com)—where every psalm or parts of each psalm have been set to music in a contemporary way. Find a natural time in your day to sing or establish a time where you need a mood lift. The afternoon slump might be the perfect time—or as part of any regular prayer time you have. Whatever you do, rejoice! He is risen! Enjoy the season.
