

REFLECT AND RESPOND 8th Sunday of Ordinary Time

FIRST READING (SIR 27:4-7)

Sirach teaches us to pay attention to how people speak; it reveals a lot. How often do you find yourself weighing your words before speaking?

SECOND READING (1 COR 15:54-58)

Paul speaks of Jesus's resurrection as taking away the "sting" and "victory" of death. What words of comfort do you use to those grieving over the death of a loved one?

GOSPEL (LK 6:39-45)

Jesus encourages His followers to be humble in judgment of others and mindful in speech. Have you had good role models in your life for these virtues?

GOSPEL MEDITATION



One of the things that older pastors and younger priests occasionally quarrel about is the proper balance between work and prayer. I know one pastor who complains that his younger associate ignores the people and the parish because he wants to spend more time in prayer. And the young priest complains that the pastor gives him too much work to do and no time to pray. The Lord's words this Sunday speak into this tension with an image that can help us find a proper balance between life and prayer.

Jesus says, "For every tree is known by its fruit. For people do not pick figs from thorn bushes, nor do they gather

grapes from brambles" (Luke 6:44). When we are deeply rooted and cultivating our relationship with Jesus, we are going to bear the fruit of that love in our lives. No fruit, no good prayer. How do we know that we are praying well? We are experiencing concrete fruits of love for others in our lives.

Someone who prays well will, sooner or later, burst forth the "figs" and "grapes" of acts of love. But without concrete commitment to deeds of selfless service to others, our prayer time is as useless as thorn bushes and brambles. Let's recommit ourselves to be men and women of prayer and service. And hopefully the pastors will help their associates to pray and serve fruitfully... with minimal quarreling.

CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

QUESTION:

Why do we place ashes on our forehead each Ash Wednesday?

ANSWER:

Ashes are rich in spiritual symbolism. We recall in the second chapter of Genesis, when the human person is fashioned "out of the dust of the ground" and receives the breath of life (Genesis 2:7). In death, a person returns to the ground from which we came. The ancient Hebrews used ashes as a sign of repentance, reminding themselves that God is God and we are not.



As the minister places ashes on our forehead, we hear either "remember that you are dust and unto dust you shall return" or "turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel." When we receive ashes, we remember our own mortality. We're reminded that we have limited time on this earth and we ought to make the best use of it that we can! People are in need of love, care, and compassion. We all need to continually rediscover the love of God. The Gospel invites every person in every stage of life to encounter and imitate Jesus here and now. The forty days of Lent are the perfect time to assess our own awareness of these realities.

"God gives us certain abilities and interests and they are truly that: gifts. This means we should approach them with gratitude and mission. Comparing ourselves to others, then, is pointless and begrudges the giver. How exquisite that we all have different gifts. And the reality that He's bestowed them on us should embolden us to develop them and serve Him and others through them."

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SAINT KATHARINE DREXEL Religious




St. Katharine Drexel (1858-1955) was a wealthy heiress from a prominent family in Philadelphia. From a young age she felt called to serve the spiritual and temporal needs of the underprivileged, particularly the African American and Native American communities. She learned the virtue of charity from her parents, who often opened their home to the poor. She began by donating money, but quickly realized this would not bring the lasting change these communities desperately needed. During an audience with Pope Leo XIII she requested that a religious order be sent to manage the institutions she was funding. In response, the Pope suggested that she herself

enter the religious life for this purpose. St. Katharine then founded the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament for Indians and Colored People. From the age of 33 until her death in 1955, Katharine invested her personal fortune of 20 million dollars in this cause. She helped build the first missions school for Native Americans in Santa Fe, and founded Xavier University in New Orleans. At the time of her death, more than 500 sisters of her order taught in over 60 schools which had been founded throughout the country. Katharine Drexel was canonized by Pope St. John Paul II in the year 2000, making her the second American-born saint. Her feast day is March 3.


SAINT CASIMIR OF POLAND Religious

St. Casimir of Poland (1458-1484) was the second son of King Casimir IV and Queen Elizabeth of Austria, one of thirteen children born to them in the royal palace at Cracow. Casimir committed his life to God from an early age, thanks in part to a brilliant and pious priest who served as the royal tutor. He turned away from the privileges of his station in life and instead exercised extreme asceticism and self-denial. He wore a hairshirt under his clothes, slept on the cold ground, and knelt in prayer for long hours outside of locked churches. At



the age of thirteen the Hungarians requested Prince Casimir to rule their country as king, which he accepted in the hope of defending the Christian nation against the Turks. However, the plan did not come to fruition and he returned home to continue his life of prayer, penance, and generosity to the poor. He later ruled Poland for a few short years while his father attended royal business in Lithuania. Casimir took a vow of celibacy which he upheld despite immense political pressure to marry. He suffered from a chronic lung condition, which he succumbed to in 1484 at the age of 25. Many miracles were attributed to his intercession after his death. St. Casimir is the patron saint of Poland, Lithuania, and young people. His feast day is March 4.

SAINT JOHN-JOSEPH OF THE CROSS Religious



St. John-Joseph of the Cross (1654-1739) was born on the island of Ischia, near Naples. He joined the Franciscan Order of the Strict Observance (the reform of St. Peter of Alcantara) at age sixteen. His influence was great despite his young age, and after three years he was sent to help found a new order of friars in Piedmont, where he was ordained to the priesthood. He codified a set of guidelines for spiritual and daily life that were approved by the Holy See and became a lasting model for religious communities. In 1702 he was appointed

Vicar Provincial of the Alcantarine Reform in Italy. During his time as Vicar he implemented a rule that no beggar would be turned away without assistance, and in times of extreme scarcity he would offer his own portion to the poor. He was known as a deeply holy man who served Christ and the monastic community through daily acts of mortification and humility. Despite his high ranking position, he continued to lead a life of service and took on menial tasks whenever possible, from working in the kitchen to chopping firewood. He was said to have performed numerous miracles as well as the gift of prophecy. St. John-Joseph of the Cross is the patron saint of Ischia and his feast day is March 5.

Dear Jesus, fill my heart so full of goodness that it produces your goodness. Let my thoughts, words, and actions reflect you. Amen.







Ash Wednesday Mass, Fasting, and the Stations of the Cross



Join us for Mass on Wednesday, March 5 at 7:30 AM or 6 PM for Ash Wednesday Mass. Attending Mass is a great way to start off the Lenten season.

Catholics in good health ages 18 to 59 are required to fast and abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Fasting consists of eating only one meal, with the possibility of

two smaller snacks that do not add up to a single full meal. Catholics age 14 and older are to abstain from meat on all Fridays in Lent.



You can also join us every Friday during Lent at 6 PM for the Stations of the Cross with the only exception being Good Friday. April 18, when Stations will be at 3 PM instead of 6 PM.



and I remind you that there is great freedom in forgiving. Ask the Lord to show you any relationships where you need to offer deeper forgiveness. Then pray, "In Jesus' name, I forgive (name) for (what), and I release them from their debt to me and ask you to bless them abundantly." Remember, forgiveness will bless you more than them! They may not even know that you were offended, yet when you forgive from the heart like Jesus, the burden, the grudge, the brooding will leave you. The love of Jesus will set you free!

Take time this month to examine your love as we approach Lent. A Lenten practice that the Lord invites us into is always better than what we throw together on Ash Wednesday! Be assured of my prayers for you, and may we grow in charity and more perfectly glorify our Father in Heaven.



LENTEN DEVOTIONALS Pick Up in the Narthex



Pick up a Lenten devotional, Daily Reflections for Lent: Not by Bread Alone, in the narthex. Each day of this devotional includes Scripture, a reflection, a meditation, and a prayer. Make Lent more than just giving up chocolate, but spend more time in prayer with Him whom loves you the most.

AN EXAMINATION OF LOVE AS LENT APPROACHES Love Transforms us and Gets us to Heaven

Over the last few years, I have spoken and written often about the importance of abiding in relationship with the Holy Trinity. The underlying principle that makes this abiding possible is the gift of God's love, which we call charity. One of the main points that I stress is that the love that transforms us and gets us to Heaven is one that loves God first and above all things. This point cannot be understated.



The Lord Himself gave this command to the people of Israel, "Hear, O Israel! The Lord is our God, the Lord alone! Therefore, you shall love the Lord, your God, with your whole heart, and with your whole being, and with your whole strength. Take to heart these words which I command you today" (Dt 6:4-6). Furthermore, Jesus in the Gospel teaches us, "as I have loved you, so you also should love one another" (Jn 13:34). And He gives us the command, "Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you" (Lk 6:27). As we begin to ponder how Jesus is calling us to approach Lent, I offer here an examination of our love. Please pray with it and ask the Lord how he is inviting you to love Him more fully.

- 1. Do you dedicate time each day to give praise and worship to God?—Daily personal prayer is necessary if we are to follow Jesus as His disciples. What we do in that time is just as important as carving the time out itself. In prayer, we want two things: to receive God's love more deeply and to love God more perfectly. I encourage you to examine how much time you spend simply telling God how much you love Him, praising Him for His goodness and blessing His name. "It is truly right and just" to worship the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Let us make sure that our prayer time is giving glory to the Holy Trinity and not only looking at ourselves.
- 2. Do you regularly read the Bible and allow it to guide your life?—Jesus teaches His disciples, "If you love me, you will keep my commandments" (Jn 14:15). If we love God above all things, His Word will shape and guide every aspect of our lives. This is nearly impossible without frequent reading and prayer with Sacred Scripture. If regular Scripture reading is new to you, begin with the Gospels (especially the Gospel of Mark!). Allow the Word to speak to your heart, listening to each word from the mouth of Jesus as addressed to you personally. In His love, how is He calling you to conform your heart and behaviors to His?
- 3. Do you make the Lord's Day a priority?—God commanded His people to keep the Sabbath holy. In the new covenant, we honor the Lord, especially on Sunday, in remembrance of Jesus' Resurrection. How do we honor the Lord on Sunday? Is it a day of rest and prayer? Or a day to catch up on work and prepare for the week ahead? Is Mass something you fit in? Or is the rest of the day scheduled around it? Do you encounter Jesus as you listen to His Word and receive Him in the Eucharist? Let your heart cry out, "Jesus, help me to love you in your Word and in the Eucharist."
- 4. Do you receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation with the intention of reconciling with God or clearing your conscience?—The sacrament of Confession is an incredible gift from God to help us receive His forgiveness and love and to grow in grace and virtue. Our disposition to the sacrament matters. Sometimes, we can be motivated to go to Confession to relieve our guilt. While we should still certainly go, it is more perfect to desire to go to Confession to reconcile with God. Do our hearts miss the intimacy we may have lost with God because of our sins? Or do we need to clear our conscience and move on?
- 5. Do you have worldly attachments which get in the way of your love for God?— Attachments are not necessarily always sinful, but they do prevent us from growing in charity. Our human hearts have finite abilities. Although we often think we can have it both ways, the Lord tells us we must choose one over the other. "No one can serve two masters. He will either hate one and love the other, or be devoted to one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and mammon" (Mt 6:24). What attachments are preventing you from serving and loving God more fully? Are you more attached to money, judgments, political parties, or work than to the love of God?
- 6. How do you give to those who have no way to repay you?—Jesus is the most perfect example of charity in action in a human heart. His highest act of charity is giving His life for us on the Cross. In Jesus' sacrifice, He shows us that if we truly loved, we would not consider "What's in it for us?" Through Jesus' Passion, God chooses to love us and fix the mess we have made, even though we have no way to repay God for original sin or our personal daily sins. In what ways do we love those who have no way to repay us or fix what they have done?
- 7. Are there relationships in your life that require deeper forgiveness?—I have written before on the necessity and power of forgiveness. I reiterate that Christians are required to forgive,

REVERENTLY DISPOSING DAMAGED BLESSED OBJECTS

Do You Have a Broken or Deteriorated Rosary or Scapular?



Father Eduardo Hayen Cuarón of Juarez, Mexico provided advice to help dispose of damaged blessed objects properly. According to the Code of Canon Law #1171, "Sacred objects, which are designated for divine worship by dedication or blessing, are to be treated reverently and are not to be employed for profane or inappropriate use even if they are owned by private persons."

On his Twitter account, Father Eduardo explained that "There are Catholics who do not know what to do with their

deteriorated religious objects that have been blessed by a priest or deacon." In a tweet with almost 5,000 views, the priest recalled these objects, "if they have been blessed by a priest, have a spiritual power, and must be treated properly when they have already been damaged..."

WHAT PROCESS SHOULD I FOLLOW?

"They can be buried or burned, giving thanks to God because they fulfilled their function of being sacramentals that led us to the sacraments and the relationship with God. If you cannot get rid of the objects, take them to a parish so they can dispose of them there."

CAN WE REPAIR THEM?

Among the comments, one user asked if a damaged rosary could be repaired. The priest noted: "Of course, it can be recovered. I have broken some rosaries, and it was all a matter of the chain being a little open in one of its gears."

ADDITIONAL WAYS TO DISPOSE OF BLESSED OBJECTS

The Diocese of Superior, Wisconsin provides these additional suggestions for damaged blessed items:

- 1. Do not throw blessed items away if they are not burnable.
- 2. Disassemble or destroy the blessed object in a manner that prevents profane use. Give them to your parish for burial in a cemetery or on Church grounds.
- 3. "If the item is metal that could be melted down for re-use, it must first be disassembled or destroyed in a way that prevents any profane re-use in its recognizable form prior to its trip to the smelter."

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
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
