

REFLECT AND RESPOND

1st Sunday of Lent

FIRST READING (DT 26:4-10)

Moses taught the Israelites the importance of remembering the story of their release from Egyptian slavery. This event defined them as a people loved by God. What is a story from your family that has helped define you?

SECOND READING (ROM 10:8-13)

Paul encouraged the Christians in Rome to have a genuine faith in Jesus in both heart and mind. As the season of Lent begins, how might you show others the sincerity of your faith?

GOSPEL (LK 4:1-13)

We hear how Jesus was tempted by the devil as He was preparing to begin His public ministry. What temptation can you confront this Lent?

GOSPEL MEDITATION



One of the most fascinating moments in American history is when George Washington could have become the king of the newly liberated United States and didn't. At the height of his power and fame, on December 23, 1783, he resigned his commission as Commander-in-Chief, and went home. The astonished King of England remarked that in doing so, Washington was "the greatest man in the world." Greatness is often defined by what we could do but don't. Greatness is measured by the temptations we overcome.

Jesus' greatness is revealed in His victory over temptations, too. The three offered Him by the devil contain, we might

say, all potential possible temptations: food, power, and fame. They correspond to the triple human needs of body, soul, and spirit. In overcoming these three, He says "no" in essence to every and even the greatest temptation. We see that every desire of His humanity—body, soul, and spirit—is perfectly united to God, to love. This is a power available to each member of His body. It is the path to true greatness. How can we, who so easily fall into even small temptations, find the power to overcome large ones? By entering into the great dynamics of Jesus' temptations.

Lenten challenge: This first week of Lent, list some concrete ways you can overcome temptations that correspond with your desires. For example, you may give up snacks between meals, choose not to participate in an activity of which you are an expert, and decide to reduce social media posting by 50%. It may not seem like much, but by saying "no" to the tyranny of food, power, and fame (in this example), you'll discover true greatness.

CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

QUESTION:

After attending our parish retreat and feeling much better and stronger about my faith, I want to make this Lent worthwhile. What can I do to keep the spirit and practice of Lent?

ANSWER:

You've already taken the first step by going on the parish retreat. It is important for us to "tune up" our faith, taking some time to renew ourselves through prayer, meditation, and education. By deepening our knowledge and understanding of faith, we are often better attuned to its richness and meaning for our life.



Lent is an intense retreat, a forty-day period of reflection and penance that prepares us to celebrate the passion, death, and resurrection of Christ. Our communication with God and our awareness of Him is the purpose of prayer. Setting aside extra time each day helps intensify the season. Prayer includes daily Mass, Stations of the Cross, communal penance services, and private confession. Making restitution for sin as well as disciplining our hearts and minds to focus on God is the purpose of penance. It helps us restore a sense of balance to our souls, thrown off kilter by sin. Penance includes personal sacrifice, self-denial, fasting, almsgiving, and charitable works.

Finally, spiritual practices help us sharpen our understanding and insight into the meaning and understanding of our faith. When you take your faith seriously, you do what is necessary to follow Jesus more closely, to integrate your life and your faith more carefully.

SAINT FRANCES OF ROME Religious




St. Frances of Rome (1384-1440) was born to a noble family in Rome. As a young girl her desire to become a nun was refused by her father, who instead arranged her marriage at the age of 12. St. Frances accepted this as God's will for her life. She was married for 40 years and had children, two of whom died from the plague. In her time Rome was at war and the city was in chaos from political disarray and widespread disease. St. Frances responded by converting her home into a hospital. She drove with a wagon into the streets and collected the

sick and stranded in order to care for them. She miraculously cured many people, and also began the city's first orphanage. She inspired many women to join her in this life of prayer and good works, and eventually founded a congregation of lay oblates attached to the Benedictine monastery known as the Oblates of St. Frances of Rome. After her husband's death she entered religious life as the group's superior. One of the great mystics of her time, she dictated 97 visions and was visibly guided by her guardian angel throughout her life. St. Frances of Rome is the patron saint of many causes, including motorists, pilots, women, widows, and against plague and the death of children. On her feast day many priests bless cars due to her patronage of cars and drivers. Her feast day is March 9.

SAINT MACARIUS OF JERUSALEM Bishop


St. Macarius of Jerusalem (4th c.) was the Bishop of Jerusalem from 312-335 A.D. Little is known of his life before this time. He took part in the Council of Nicea in 325 A.D. and vigorously opposed the Arian heresy, which greatly threatened the early Church. It is believed that he was one of the bishops who helped draft the Nicene Creed. St. Athanasius, his contemporary, refers to Macarius as an example of "the honest and simple style of apostolical men." After the council, St. Macarius accompanied St. Helen, the



queen mother of the Roman Emperor Constantine, in her successful search for the True Cross that Jesus was crucified upon. It was he who suggested to St. Helen that she would identify the real Cross by touching all three of those she found to a seriously ill woman, and observe which one brought immediate healing. Following the discovery of the True Cross in this miraculous manner, Constantine wrote to Bishop Macarius requesting that he oversee the construction of a magnificent church in Jerusalem, the Basilica of the Holy Sepulchre, to commemorate the sites of the Crucifixion and Burial of Christ, which still exists today as one of the most important Christian pilgrimage sites in the world. His feast day is March 10.

SAINT MATILDA OF SAXONY





St. Matilda (895-968 A.D.) was born in Prussia, the daughter of a Count, and was raised and educated in a monastery by her grandmother, who was the abbess. A political marriage was arranged for her to Henry I, the future king of Germany. Henry and Matilda enjoyed a happy and blessed marriage. As the Queen of Germany, Matilda became the mother of five important historical figures: Holy Roman Emperor Otto I; Henry, Duke of Bavaria; St. Bruno, Archbishop of Cologne; Gerberga, wife of King Louis IV of France; and Hedwig, mother of

Hugh Capet. Matilda was a holy and virtuous woman known for her generosity to the poor. The king adored his queen and attributed his success in battle to her prayers. They reigned seventeen years, and their eldest son succeeded the throne and became Emperor Otto I. After her husband's death, Matilda's two eldest sons chastised her for her generous almsgiving. St. Matilda then took the possessions left to her by her husband and turned them over to her sons, and retired from court. Her sons immediately suffered misfortune, which was attributed to their poor treatment of their holy mother. In order to repair this injustice and regain God's favor, St. Matilda was begged to return to court, which she did, forgiving her sons for their ill will. She continued to help the poor, build churches, and support many monasteries. St. Matilda was a celebrated monarch and was venerated by the people immediately after her death. Her feast day is March 14.




STATIONS OF THE CROSS Every Friday at 6 PM


evening after the Irish Person of the Year is awarded. Support for the event is provided by the Ancient Order of Hibernians Sarpy Co. Div.

MARCH IS THE MONTH OF ST. JOSPEH The Unfailing Prayer of St. Joseph

For centuries, Christians have relied on the intercessory prayers of Joseph, earthly spouse of the Blessed Virgin and foster father of Christ, who was obedient to the will of God in all things.

One particular novena prayer to St. Joseph is often called "the unfailing prayer to St. Joseph." It is thought to have originated in the first century A.D. and was sent by the pope to Emperor Charles as he went into battle. It is said that those who recite this prayer will not suffer a sudden death and will likewise be protected from drowning, the effects of poison and fire, falling into the hands of the enemy or being overpowered in battle.



SILENCE IN CHURCH

Maintain Silence Before and After Mass in the Church



The 2002 General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) speaks very specifically about silence before and during the liturgy. We read: "Sacred silence also, as part of the celebration, is to be observed at the designated times. Its purpose, however, depends on the time it occurs in each part of the celebration. Thus within the Act of Penitence and again after the invitation to

pray, all recollect themselves; but at the conclusion of a reading or a homily, all meditate briefly on what they have heard; then after Communion, they praise and pray to God in their hearts."

There should also be silence before the liturgy: "Even before the celebration itself, it is commendable that silence be observed in the church, in the sacristy, in the vesting room, and in adjacent areas, so that all may dispose themselves to carry out the sacred action in a devout and fitting manner" (No. 45).

Though not mentioned in the GIRM, there is a long practice of maintaining silence within the body of the church after Mass. Some churches erupt in noise once Mass is over. This destroys the atmosphere of prayer that is conducive and appropriate to private prayer after Mass.

How does a pastor encourage an atmosphere of silence? By giving good example himself. If he is walking up and down the aisles and engaging in audible conversations, then he is giving a wrong cue to the people. Even worse is the practice of priests, deacons, and ministers chatting in the sanctuary area before Mass.

Some carefully worded admonitions during the announcements period toward the end of Mass would go a long way toward encouraging the correct atmosphere regarding silence. In my experience, people are often unaware of the distracting nature of their chatting, and they are open to correction.

One of the devices I myself use is always to respond in a whisper when people come to talk to me in the church before Mass. Mostly, they take the hint (that they should be speaking quietly) and are not offended.

WE MUST GIVE TO GOD AND TO THE POOR The Difference Between Alms and Tithes

A common misunderstanding is that almsgiving and tithing are not distinct, that they are the same thing, or that one can substitute for the other. In reality, they are two different acts of justice which are both required by the Gospel.



Almsgiving is an act of justice which falls under the principle of the Universal Destination of Goods. This principle of Catholic Social Teaching comes from Genesis, where God gives all the goods of the earth to mankind for our use. Thus, the goods of the earth, natural resources, are meant to be used by all people who need them. Every person has the right to those goods which they need to live a decent life. Each person has a right to work to procure these goods—suitable employment with a just wage is a human right. If someone is in need or is poor, then they have a right to receive alms—and Christians have a duty to give them alms. Many Fathers of the Church assert that failing to give alms to those in need constitutes stealing from them.

Christ is clear that we must give alms; it is not optional: "Beware of practicing your piety before men in order to be seen by them; for then you will have no reward from your Father who is in Heaven. Thus, when you give alms, sound no trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, that they may be praised by men. Truly, I say to you, they have their reward. But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your alms may be in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you." (Matthew 6:1-4)

Almsgiving is divided into the seven spiritual and seven corporeal works of mercy, so there are a many ways we can give alms and many different causes or organizations we could support with them (*Thomas Aquinas, ST II-II, q. 32, a. 2*). We can certainly choose to give alms to charitable organizations (non-profits) who will use the money well. We can also boycott organizations involved with various evils (those recommending contraception for example). So in almsgiving, we can take account of how the alms may be used.

Tithing is a completely different practice. These two acts are similar only in material manifestations: both are acts of giving away money. Formally, they are distinct acts. While almsgiving is a matter of justice towards others, towards the poor, tithing is a matter of justice towards God. Tithing is an act of the virtue of religion, which is concerned with giving God His due worship (*Aquinas, ST II-II, q. 81, 87*). Tithing is about giving a portion of our wealth back to God from whom it came. To do this, we give it to Christ's Body, the Church. Further, it is a matter of justice towards the Church who feeds us spiritually. St. Paul writes, "If we have sown spiritual good among you, is it too much if we reap your material benefits? If others share this rightful claim upon you, do not we still more?" (1 Corinthians 9:11-12).

Traditionally, tithes were paid at a ten-percent rate. One took ten-percent of one's income and gave it to the temple (in the Old Testament) or to the Church. While the Church no longer prescribes a set amount of tithes, Catholics are still bound on pain of mortal sin (sin of grave matter) to monetarily contribute to the Church (CCC 2043). As a precept of the Church, this is as grave a duty as attending Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation.

Unlike almsgiving, where we ought to have some concern that the money we give will be used well (that is the whole point of almsgiving, to help poor people), tithes take no such considerations into account. We are bound to give money to the Church as an act of worship towards God and justice towards the Church who spiritually nourishes us through the sacraments. This obligation remains even if the members of the Church in charge of finances are evil, even if we are certain the money we give will be squandered, even if we are sure the clerics will use our tithes to fund their lusts with prostitutes. When we tithe, we give money to God. If clerics then abuse that money, the sin is entirely theirs.

While this seems hard, it is what Christ Himself did. In Luke 21, Christ famously praises the poor widow who gave her last two coins to the temple. Christ also pays the temple tax in Mathew 17:24-27. Even though Christ, as the Messiah and Son of God, is exempt from tithing, He chooses to pay it to avoid scandal to others. Yet, the temple system was especially corrupt in Christ's time. He drives out money changers from the temple with just anger in all four Gospels (Matthew 21, Mark 11, Luke 19, John 2). Christ denounces the many sins of the scribes and Pharisees in Matthew 23. Ultimately, the temple assembly chose to execute Christ. A Church filled with corrupt members, like the temple at Christ's time, would not remove our obligation to tithe.

Tithing and almsgiving are distinct. Both are necessary. They cannot be substituted for each other. One cannot neglect either. One cannot choose only one option. One cannot do extra almsgiving instead of tithing, or extra tithing instead of almsgiving. We must both give to God and give to the poor.




