

## REFLECT AND RESPOND 3rd Sunday of Easter

### FIRST READING (ACTS 5:27-32, 40B-41)

The Apostles "rejoiced" when they suffered public dishonor for preaching that Jesus rose from the dead. Have you ever found joy amid your own suffering?

### SECOND READING (RV 5:11-14)

John has a vision of the whole created order worshipping and praising Jesus as the slain and risen Lamb. In what ways will you praise and worship Jesus this week?

### GOSPEL (JN 21:1-19 OR 21:1-14)

The resurrected Jesus reveals to Peter that the cost of following Him and leading the disciples will be his own martyrdom. How are you sometimes challenged in following Jesus?

## GOSPEL MEDITATION



I eat breakfast. If I don't have something substantial, I'm fading by midmorning. Breakfast is my key meal because it sets up my physical wellbeing for the rest of the day.

Spiritually speaking, we need sustenance to get us going. This is true for the Apostles in this Sunday's remarkable Gospel reading. The risen Jesus makes His third appearance to them in the early morning light and calls, "Come, have breakfast" (John 21:12). The exhausted and cold fishermen sit, and He feeds them bread and fish as the dawn breaks. They are overwhelmed by His presence to the point of awestruck silence. As they eat, their bodies

and their hearts come alive. Once refreshed by their morning meal, they will be ready to feed others—indeed, the whole world—with the love of the risen Jesus. But first, they need breakfast from Him.

Do you realize how essential early morning prayer is? Jesus desires to refresh us every morning with His word of love, with His grace-filled presence. This week, hear Jesus calling to you: "Come, have breakfast!" Embrace some form of spiritual, meditative practice each morning for spiritual strength to get you going.

## CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

### QUESTION:

I can't explain it. I feel a nudge from God to something out of the ordinary. How do I respond?

#### ANSWER:

You're in good company! Abraham was asked to leave all he knew and loved for a strange land, with only abstract divine assurance that such a sacrifice would be worth it. Plenty of prophets protested against God's call, whether it was claiming they were too young (Jeremiah) or running away entirely, only to end up in a whale's belly (Jonah). St. Joseph was asked to do something very strange. He was asked to believe—on the word of an




angelic appearance in a dream—that his betrothed was pregnant not from another man, but by a miraculous intervention of God. Then he was called to marry her.

Author Flannery O'Connor once wrote, "You shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you odd." Sometimes God's invitation might seem strange or challenging. It might require sacrifices we never expected to make. Our life might look different than we had always imagined. But as we all know, life throws its own curveballs, regardless of whether or not we're listening for God's will. Better, one would think, to be open to the promptings of God and to follow along the strange trails that they lead. We have the assurance that, eventually, we will find green pastures.

"When we have too many vocal prayers to say, our goal easily changes to getting them done instead of praying them well. They become less, rather than more, contemplative. The Holy Spirt might be moving us to linger silently on the meditation of a mystery, but we feel that we can't stop or we will never fit all our prayers in. So we find ourselves working against the Holy Spirit... We forget that the very purpose of prayer is communing with the Lord." —Dan Burke and Connie Rossini

## SAINT ISIDORE OF SEVILLE Bishop and Doctor of the Church



St. Isidore of Seville (560 – 636 A.D.) was born in Carthagena, Spain, to noble and pious parents. After the example of their parents, he, as well as his two brothers and sister, all became saints. Isidore received his early education at the cathedral school in Seville where a group of learned men taught classical education, among them was his brother Leander, the Archbishop of Seville. The cathedral school was the first of its kind in the country and Isidore excelled in his studies there. He became a man of great learning, zeal, piety, and apostolic

endeavor, assisting his brother in converting the Visigoths from the Arian heresy. He followed his brother in becoming next Archbishop of Seville, leading his diocese for nearly 40 years. Isidore was an important saint for his time. He was one of the most learned men of the 6th century and is considered the last of the early Church Fathers. He was a prolific writer on the sciences and the classics which in effect helped preserve western civilization during the early middle ages following the barbarian invasions. He composed history books, a dictionary with a structure akin to a database, and an encyclopedia which was used for nine centuries. St. Isidore reunited Spain after the barbarian onslaught, making it a center of culture and learning. He required seminaries to be built in every diocese, wrote a rule for religious orders, and founded schools that taught every branch of learning. Spain then became a model for similar renewal in other European countries. For his great learning and written works he was proclaimed a Doctor of the Church by Pope Benedict XIV. St. Isidore of Seville is the patron of computers, schoolchildren, and the internet. His feast day is April 4.

## SAINT VINCENT FERRER Priest

St. Vincent Ferrer (1350-1419) was born in Valentia, Spain, the son of a knight. From his parents he learned virtue and generosity to the poor. As a child he fasted every Wednesday and Friday and was tenderly devoted to the Passion of Christ and the Blessed Mother. He excelled in his studies and joined the Dominican Order with the support of his parents. He flourished in both austerity and scholarship, and became famous for performing more miracles than any other saint. His miracleworking powers began in the womb with the



healing of a blind woman who touched his mother's pregnant belly. He began a preaching career across Europe that continued for twenty years. He was followed by a train of priests, nuns, penitents, and pilgrims that numbered in the thousands. When he arrived in a village his retinue would set up camp, and St. Vincent would preach to great crowds on the subjects of sin, death, Heaven, and hell. He would also celebrate Mass and hear confessions daily. He slept on the floor and maintained a perpetual fast. Twice a day the "Bell of Miracles" was rung when all the sick and infirm were brought to him for cures; it was not unusual for him to perform one hundred miracles in a day. He also made scores of converts among the Muslims and Jews. St. Vincent believed that he was a special messenger of penance sent by God to prepare men for the final judgment; at that time the Black Death was ravaging across Europe killing millions, and the Great Schism was rending the Church in two. Through him multitudes were brought to penance and conversion. St. Vincent Ferrer's feast day is April 5.

In the time of Jesus, as well as in our own day, doing an action "in the name of" someone meant doing it on that person's behalf. One is delegated to act in that person's stead with all the requisite authority and power. Since we are one in Jesus, it is Jesus Himself who acts through us when we do His will. We read in Colossians: "Whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him" (Col. 3:17). This is true of casting out demons as well. The exorcist has no authority over demons except that which the Lord Himself gives through the delegation of the bishop. Jesus explicitly told us to act on His behalf to cast out demons. We read in the Gospel of Luke: "He summoned the Twelve and gave them power and authority over all demons" (Luke 9:1). When the demons hear the exorcist invoke the name of Jesus, they are directly confronted with the power and authority of Jesus Himself. Against Him, they are no match.





## NEBRASKA CATHOLIC DAY OF GIVING Giving Day on May 7—Donate Online or Offline

## BREAK DOWN OF COST

**Updating the Sound System**—With a sound system in the Church being 20 years old it's time to upgrade to have better sound during Mass. Rough estimated cost: \$100,000.

**Repairs to the Concrete**—This summer we will continue concrete repairs throughout the parking lot and sidewalks from normal wear and tear. Estimated cost: \$64,575.

**Restoring our Stained Glass Windows**—Overtime time, the metal bracing of a stained glass window becomes warped and it is preventative maintenance to have them flattened and re-braced. In total an estimated cost of: \$75.100.





## POPE FRANCIS HAS PASSED AWAY, WHAT'S NEXT? Election of a New Pope

**Sede Vacante**—the period of time when the papacy is vacant.

Camerlengo—is a cardinal in the Roman Catholic Church who serves as the interim administrator of the Holy See during the time between a Pope's death and the election of his successor. His duties include: ascertain the Pope's death, make all the arrangements for the Pope's funeral and burial, break the Ring of the Fisherman (annulling the seal of the pontificate), oversee voting in the Sistine Chapel, request reports, balance sheets, and budgets, and to approve who will help in the dining room, with cleaning, medical assistance, and confessions. The Camerlengo holds temporary stewardship of the Vatican. The current



Camerlengo is Cardinal Kevin Farrell, Prefect of the Dicastery for Laity, Family, and Life.

Interregnum—nearly all high ranking cleric of the Holy See immediately looses their job. (Similar to a new president selecting a new cabinet while he is in office, here in the United States.) The new Pope will select members of the Roman Curia, their own governing body. The Cardinal-Vicar of Rome, the Major Pententiary, Head of the Apostolic Penitentiary, and the Apostolic Nuncios (Vatican Ambassadors) are the only officials to remain in power.

**Novendiales**—nine days of Masses and prayers for the Roman Pontiff. This is a time of mourning throughout the Church.

Conclave—a secret assembly of Cardinals to elect a new pope. The conclave usually begins 15-20 days after the Pope's death. All Cardinals under the age of 80 gather in the Sistine Chapel by guidance of the Holy Spirit praying together and voting up to four times a day for the new Pope. The Cardinals take an oath of secrecy and vow not to be influenced by any external forces. The Master of Papal Liturgical Ceremonies and the Secretary of the College of Cardinals are non-Cardinal priests or bishops who assist the voting process in between the sessions. When one man receives two-thirds majority, he becomes the new pope. As the voting continues, black smoke is seen from the chimney for every time the Cardinals have not reached a two-thirds majority. White smoke is seen once a new Pope has been selected. (If you'd like to know more about the process of the conclave, check out this YouTube video from Father David Michael Moses titled "What Happens in a Conclave? Everything You Need to Know," https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ENk\_Lm96yMI.)

**Cum clave**—Latin for "locked" or "with a key" meaning that the doors of the Sistine Chapel are locked and the Cardinals are not to leave until a new Pope is selected. This is where we get the term conclave.

**Habemus Papam**—Latin for "we have a Pope!" The phrase signals the end of the conclave and the beginning of the new Pope's reign. The announcement is made from the balcony of St. Peter's Basilica. His papal name is revealed and will offer his first blessing as the Successor of Peter

During this time, we pray for the soul of Pope Francis, and we pray for the Church in this time of transition, for the Cardinals' discernment, unity in the Church, and the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

Lord of the Harvest, we thank you for the life and witness of Pope Francis—for his mercy, courage, and steadfast "yes" to your divine invitation. May his legacy stir hearts to follow you boldly—as priests, religious, and holy spouses. Raise up a new generation of faithful laborers through the seeds Pope Francis planted. And may the next Successor of Peter be filled with wisdom and grace. Amen.


