REFLECT AND RESPOND

4th Sunday of Easter

FIRST READING (ACTS 13:14, 43-52)

Paul and Barnabas experienced resistance from some of the Jews and leaders of the city of Antioch. What sustains you in difficult and challenging experiences?

SECOND READING (RV 7:9, 14B-17)

John sees a vision in which those who have suffered and died for the faith are comforted by God and relieved of their distress. Is there a family member or friend you could comfort this week?

GOSPEL (JN 10:27-30)

We hear how Jesus gives eternal life to all who follow Him. How does following Jesus impact your work or family life?

GOSPEL MEDITATION



A few years back, I felt as if I couldn't hear God's voice the way I used to. The words in the Bible seemed like cold ink on a page. Prayer felt like sitting anxiously in a lonely room. I was worried—how could I, a priest, preach or help others if I couldn't hear God's voice? It went on for months.

Then a friend encouraged me to go on a retreat and spend as much time as possible in silence. After a day or two of quiet prayer, I noticed gentle but clear thoughts of repentance in two specific areas of my life. I asked God for the grace to change, and I went to confession. Suddenly,

the divine silence that haunted me was filled with a sense of God's closeness and goodness. I realized, gratefully, that God had been speaking to me in the quiet voice of my conscience.

This week we hear Jesus say, "My sheep hear my voice. I know them and they follow me" (John 10:27). Jesus links the hearing of His voice to following Him. He speaks to us in our conscience in an intimate, personal way, when we most need to hear Him. When you feel deaf to God's voice, perhaps it is time to listen in silence for His voice in your conscience calling you to hear and follow the Good Shepherd of your soul.

CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

QUESTION:

Why do Catholics genuflect?

ANSWER:

Genuflection is an act of devotion that literally means "to bend the knee." For many Catholics, it's an almost automatic gesture that we perform before entering our pew or row of seats at Mass. But, like many of the symbols and




gestures of our faith tradition, genuflecting can also be an invitation for deeper reflection.

The practice of "bending the knee" is an ancient way of recognizing the presence of someone greater than we are. It has been said that the practice dates back to the time of Alexander the Great, but it became a common part of etiquette in the royal courts of the Middle Ages. From throne rooms and palaces, it was a small step to genuflecting becoming part of the devotional lives of Christians, who used this secular gesture as a way of recognizing the presence of the One who is King of Kings, especially in the Eucharist.

Today, Catholics are asked to genuflect in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament (whether in the tabernacle or exposed on the altar during Eucharistic Adoration). So, while it has become second nature to genuflect before entering your seat in church, we should pay attention to where the Blessed Sacrament is kept in each church or chapel that we visit, and genuflect in the direction of the tabernacle where the Blessed Sacrament is kept. In churches or chapels in which the tabernacle is in a separate space, we are invited to simply bow toward the altar.

In addition to genuflecting before the Blessed Sacrament, we are also instructed to genuflect before the cross used for veneration on Good Friday (during the solemn celebrations of the Lord's Passion) and any time a relic of the True Cross is displayed for veneration. This long-standing tradition is a way of honoring the cross as the great sign of our salvation and of showing devotion to the passion of Jesus.

BLESSED IMELDA LAMBERTINI Religious



Bl. Imelda Lambertini (1322–1333) was born to a noble and devout family in Bologna, Italy. As a child she developed a great love for prayer, the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, and the Holy Eucharist. She spent much of her time in the Dominican monastery praying with the nuns, and at nine years of age requested to enter there as a postulant. Her parents and the nuns allowed her to enter, however, in that era children her age were not permitted to receive Holy Communion. Imelda repeatedly pleaded to receive Communion, but each

time she was denied. Nevertheless, she developed a close relationship with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. When the feast of the Ascension approached, Imelda begged to make her First Holy Communion on this feast. Again, she was denied. On the Vigil of the Feast of the Ascension she was in the chapel praying, as usual, as the other Sisters received Holy Communion. Afterwards a glowing host was seen suspended in the air above the child. The priest understood this as a sign that the child should be permitted to receive, and he ministered the Holy Eucharist to her. Imelda remained kneeling in prayer in thanksgiving as the nuns left the chapel. When they returned for her, they found her just as they had left her, but her body was lifeless. It was understood that Imelda died of pure ecstatic joy after receiving Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, as she had so ardently desired. Bl. Imelda Lambertini is the patron saint of First Communicants. Her feast day is May 12.


SAINT JULIANA OF NORWICH Religious

St. Julian/Juliana of Norwich (1342–1416) is a Benedictine nun who lived as a recluse in Norwich, England. Little is known of her life with certainty. At the age of 30 she was suddenly struck by a severe illness which almost took her life. During this illness she received a series of visions of Jesus Christ in sixteen separate revelations. When she recovered from her illness the visions stopped. Fifteen years later, Our Lord appeared to her to give her the meaning of her visions. St. Julian wrote her visions down in a book called



Revelations of Divine Love, the earliest surviving book in the English language known to have been written by a woman. After these revelations she began to live a solitary life as an anchoress in a little cell built into the wall at the church of St. Julian in Norwich, not far from London. During her life the Church was in schism, and England was caught in a long war with France. The book contains a message of optimism based on the certainty of being loved by God and of being protected by His Providence. She received visitors to her cell and gave them guidance on the spiritual life, becoming a spiritual mother to many. St. Julian is an important medieval mystic whose response to the problem of evil is cited in the Catechism of the Catholic Church. Her feast day is May 13.

SAINT MATTHIAS THE APOSTLE Apostle and Martyr



St. Matthias the Apostle (1st c.) followed Jesus during His entire earthly ministry and was one of His 72 disciples. Matthias was chosen by the 11 Apostles to replace Judas Iscariot after his betrayal of Christ and subsequent suicide. After Christ's Ascension into Heaven, St. Matthias devoted himself to preaching Christianity among the pagans, some of them barbarians and cannibals, all over Judea, Cappadocia, and Ethiopia for over 30 years. Many miracles are ascribed to him as the pagans sought to kill him: that

he was unharmed after being forced to drink poison, that he once hid by becoming invisible, and that the earth opened up and swallowed his attackers. St. Matthias also preached the need for mortification of the flesh as an aid to growth in holiness. Eventually, at God's appointed time, he was martyred for the cause of Christ, though there are conflicting traditions as to exactly where and how. St. Matthias is the patron saint of carpenters, tailors, and reformed alcoholics. His feast day is May 14.



CEMETERY CLEAN UP Holy Sepulchre Cemetery








NEBRASKA CATHOLIC DAY OF GIVING Extended Giving Until May 14

CATHOLIC DEVOTIONS EXPLAINED The Rosary



Christians have used beads to mark the recitation of prayers since ancient times. In the 12th century, the Rosary emerged as a meditative devotion centering on significant moments in the lives of Jesus and Mary. In the words of St. Leo XIII, "there is no more excellent way of praying."

The Rosary is traditionally attributed to a Marian vision received by St. Dominic de Guzman (1170-1221). Though scholarship on this point is uncertain, the Dominican Order was undoubtedly crucial in establishing and evangelizing the Rosary as a devotional prayer.

Over the centuries, the formula of the devotion eventually took the shape of 50 Hail Marys divided into five "decades," with each decade focused on a different mystery. The Church has defined the Joyful Mysteries (to be recited on Saturdays and Mondays), the Glorious Mysteries (Sundays and Wednesdays), the Sorrowful Mysteries (Tuesdays and Fridays), and most recently the Luminous Mysteries (to be recited on Thursdays).

"Let us love Jesus above all, let us love Mary as our mother; but then, how could we keep from loving Joseph, who was so intimately united to both Jesus and Mary? And how can we honor him better than by imitating his virtues? Now, what else did he do in all his life but contemplate, study, and adore Jesus, even in the midst of his daily labors? Behold, therefore, our model." —St. Madeleine Sophie Barat



THE TRUTH ABOUT ABORTION DRUGS Two Women Speak Out



For women and girls facing a pregnancy in difficult circumstances, abortion drugs can seem like a logical solution. They're "a safe and effective way to end an early pregnancy," Planned Parenthood claims on its website. "Safer than Advil," abortion advocates insist. In reality, the two drugs—mifepristone and misoprostol—can cause serious, even life-threatening complications. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration's own label for these abortion drugs says that roughly one in 25 women who take them will end up in the emergency room and up to 7% will require surgery.

When the FDA approved the drugs in 2000, it did so with important safety standards. Since then, it has removed safeguards such as in-person doctor visits, ongoing care, and other health protections. Now, women and girls can order abortion drugs by mail and take them alone in their homes or dorm rooms—often unaware of what they will experience or that emergency care may be necessary.

Alliance Defending Freedom is asking the U.S. Supreme Court to hold the FDA accountable for unlawfully removing crucial safeguards for the use of abortion drugs. Oral arguments in the case, U.S. Food and Drug Administration v. Alliance for Hippocratic Medicine, took place in March. A decision is expected in June. Here, an OB/GYN and a woman who experienced a chemical abortion share their own stories of the abortion drugs' dangers.

DR. CHRISTINA FRANCIS

"Easy everywhere." According to Christian thinker Andy Crouch, this is what technology promises us all today. Look no further than the rise of artificial intelligence systems like ChatGPT over the last year to see this being promised even more. Need to write a difficult message to a friend? Have ChatGPT do it. With each keystroke, our human world becomes a little less human.

"Easy everywhere" is also the promise of chemical abortion drug manufacturers and the FDA. It's a promise that these drugs are not only safe for women, but that women can take them at home—alone—without even one in-person doctor visit. It's a promise that seeks to normalize what countless women tell me was one of the most painful, isolating moments of their lives.

As an OB/GYN who has cared for thousands of pregnant women, I know that women don't pursue abortion lightly or enthusiastically. It's never easy. It's tragic. Women are often pressured into abortion. A study by the Charlotte Lozier Institute found that over 60% of women reported feeling "high levels of pressure to abort from one or more sources."

Women who take abortion drugs are promised an easy experience. Complications are rare, they're told. The reality, though, is that a significant number of women will experience severe complications from these drugs that require immediate medical attention. Data cited by the FDA itself showed that hospitalizations increased 300% with no in-person doctor visit. Yet the FDA has removed nearly every safety standard it once provided to women using abortion drugs.

My colleagues and I see women in our hospitals on a regular basis who are suffering because of the FDA's reckless removal of these essential safeguards. We have cared for women who've required emergency D&Cs, antibiotics, blood transfusions, and hospitalizations for several days. They think they might be dying. They are not told that they will go into labor and deliver their dead babies all alone on the bathroom floor.

Another significant risk is an unknown ectopic pregnancy. Ultrasound is the most accurate way to diagnose the condition, which occurs in one in 50 pregnancies. If a patient with undiagnosed ectopic pregnancy takes abortion drugs, she will think her symptoms are simply the drugs' side effects. A friend and fellow OB/GYN treated a patient... who experienced a sharp abdominal pain after starting a chemical abortion. Then days of worsening pain. Weeks later, she was rushed to the hospital when her blood pressure dropped to dangerous levels. During emergency surgery, my colleague discovered that the patient had experienced a ruptured ectopic pregnancy. These women are being sold the lie of "easy everywhere."

ELIZABETH GILLETTE

I was 24 years old and had a great life—a college degree, a good job, and a boyfriend I cared about very much. Then came a shocking complication: two pink lines on a pregnancy test. Suddenly, I had no idea what my future was going to look like. And my boyfriend made it clear he wasn't ready to be a dad. "This is the worst thing that could happen to me," he said when I shared the news, scared and hoping for support. Instead, he pressured me into making an appointment at a local abortion clinic, even after I told him I didn't think it was the right thing to do.

The coercion started the moment I called the clinic. I'd

need to come in right away to have the "easy procedure," the receptionist told me, explaining that once I was more than 10 weeks into my pregnancy, I'd have to have a "really terrible" surgical procedure. Abortion drugs, she said repeatedly, were the safe, easy way to end my pregnancy. When I went to the clinic to pick up the drugs, I was told that I would experience a double period and some light cramping—nothing that a heating pad and some Tylenol wouldn't take care of. But my experience was so much more traumatic than that.



I had intense cramping and waves of pain from my head to my toes. I bled profusely, blood running down my legs and pooling on the bathroom floor. Something is wrong, I thought. I'm going to die on this bathroom floor. But I felt that I'd made this choice and would have to see it through. If I die, my parents are going to find out what I've done. So, I'd better not die. The worst part—what nobody had told me about—was when I delivered the amniotic sack with my tiny child inside. I held my baby, saw its eyes and fingers... then flushed it down the toilet. But I still see it. You can't unsee something like that.

My bleeding continued for more than a month. I had residual cramping that lasted even longer, as well as headaches, nausea, and tremors. No doctor ever checked on me or told me to come in for a follow-up visit to check for severe bleeding or life-threatening infections. Today, I still suffer from post-traumatic stress disorder.

I was shocked when I heard that the FDA was removing the abortion drugs' safety standards. My experience was traumatic and terrifying. I can only imagine what women will face now, with the FDA removing even the initial in-person doctor visit. Women taking these drugs without that initial doctor visit are at risk for so many devastating consequences. Who's going to check them for an ectopic pregnancy? Who's going to protect them from bleeding and sepsis? Who's going to counsel them about the reality of chemical abortion and the physical, emotional, and psychological risks?

These are high-risk drugs that should never be available over the counter with no ongoing care from a doctor. When the FDA recklessly removed its original safeguards, it betrayed women like me. The Supreme Court needs to recognize this truth. It's time for the Court to say enough and to defend women's health.
