

We hear how the church in Jerusalem resolved their conflicts through dialogue and compromise. When has your faith community had to resolve a conflict?


#### SECOND READING (RV 21:10-14, 22-23)

As John's final vision continues, he sees the splendor and glory of God lighting the city of Jerusalem. Can you think of a time when you felt really close to God?

#### GOSPEL (JN 14:23-29)

Jesus taught His disciples that the Holy Spirit will be sent to believers to teach them and remind them of His words. Can you share a time when you have felt inspired by the Holy Spirit?

#### **GOSPEL MEDITATION**



Jonathan Haidt's 2024 book entitled *The Anxious Generation* argues that today's kids are marked by significant increases in anxiety, as the title suggests. Smartphones, social media, economic uncertainty, the chaos of a global pandemic, fear regarding climate change, and the so-called "meaning crisis" all contribute to strikingly high levels of anxiety in young people today. I'm a bit older than this generation, but I feel it, too. The world can be too much to handle.

The Gospel this week offers a stunning solution for troubled souls. To His overwhelmed and anxious disciples,

the risen Jesus says, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you" (John 14:27). His peace is that of the one who was overwhelmed on the cross and then conquered death by the power of His divinity, His bond of love with the Father. He offers us this unshakeable peace.

Of course, mental illness does not magically disappear because of the risen Jesus. But He does walk with us and offer us His peace in the midst of our suffering. The peace the world gives is not like His because it is weak, uncertain, and self-generated. Jesus' peace is strong, sure, and given as a gift from God. He gives it to us amid our anxiety. Will you receive it as a gift? I hope so. He wants to fill the hearts of this generation with His peace.

#### CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

#### QUESTION:

Why do Catholics need to go to Mass every Sunday?

#### ANSWER:

The heart of the Church's instruction that we are to attend Mass on Sundays goes back to the Third Commandment: "Take care to keep holy the sabbath day as the LORD, your God, has commanded




you" (Deuteronomy 5:12). Although the Jewish People celebrate the Sabbath on Saturday, the first generations of Christians began to observe the sabbath on Sunday, recognizing how important it is for Christians to celebrate the day that Jesus rose from the dead. As the *United States Catholic Catechism for Adults* observes, "Sunday extends the celebration of Easter throughout the year... It makes present the new creation brought about by Christ" (364).

The focus of our Sunday should be the celebration of the Eucharist in the Mass. This is our time to be formed by God's Word and nourished at the table of the Lord, becoming prepared to live out and share our faith in the week that follows. In his encyclical, *Dies Domini*, Pope St. John Paul II reminded us that Christians "cannot live their faith or share fully in the life of the Christian community unless they take part regularly in the Sunday Eucharistic assembly" (81). This is why the Church teaches us that Sunday Mass is a nonnegotiable part of being a Christian (see *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 2192).

Beyond being a time of worship, we should also remember that Sunday is intended to be a day of rest, when we make time for recreation, for sharing meals, and enjoying the company of friends and family. Sunday is given to as a day to take stock of and enjoy the blessings that God has given us (see *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 2187). Pope Francis reminds us, "The day of rest, centered on the Eucharist, sheds its light on the whole week, and motivates us to greater concern for nature and the poor" (*Laudato Si'*, 237).

#### SAINT PHILIP NERI

#### Priest




St. Philip Neri (1515–1595) was born in Florence, Italy, to the noble class. He was a dutiful child with a cheerful disposition, making him popular with all who knew him. At the age of 18 he was to begin an apprenticeship for a career in business. However, after having a mystical experience, his life was radically changed. He traveled to Rome and entrusted himself completely to God's providence. He found living accommodations with a fellow Florentine in exchange for tutoring his sons, which Philip did with great skill. He then enrolled in

philosophy and theology classes at a local monastery in order to become a priest. Although he excelled in his studies, he suddenly quit in order to spiritually serve the people of Rome. At that time, indifference, luxury, and corruption were widespread characteristics of the Roman clergy. Churches were neglected, flocks were abandoned, and the loss of faith was widespread. St. Philip Neri, with his commitment to a life of asceticism, was a contradiction to all of this malaise. With his characteristic good-naturedness, he lead many to a life of virtue and love for God as he traveled through the streets of Rome. He began an oratory for laymen to gather together and practice greater spiritual discipline, which grew and became famous. In obedience to his spiritual director he finally became a priest at the age of 34. He also started a religious order known simply as "The Oratory." St. Philip Neri is known as the "Apostle of Rome." He is the patron of Rome and the U.S. Army Special Forces. His feast day is May 26.


### SAINT PETRONILLE Virgin Martyr

St. Petronille (1st c.), also known as Petronilla, was a virgin martyr of the early Church in Rome. According to tradition she was connected to St. Peter the Apostle; she may have been either his natural daughter, servant, convert (spiritual daughter), or co-laborer in the faith. It is also a tradition that St. Petronilla was cured of palsy by St. Peter. She is remembered for being beautiful, for refusing marriage to a pagan king due to her vow of chastity, and for suffering martyrdom for her unwavering faith. In the 8th century the chapel



containing her relics became the burial place of French kings. This is due to the fact that she was the supposed daughter of St. Peter, and the French kings were considered the "adopted sons" of St. Peter; therefore, St. Petronille was invoked as an intercessor for all treaties between the Holy See and the French crown. Her relics were later moved to St. Peter's Basilica in Rome, and on her feast day Mass at St. Peter's is offered for France and attended by French residents living in Rome. St. Petronille is the patroness of the dauphins of France, mountain travelers, and against fever. Her feast day is May 31.

## SAINT BERNARD OF MONTJOUX Priest



St. Bernard of Montjoux (c. 923–1008 A.D.), also known as St. Bernard of Menthon, was born to a wealthy and noble family in the Kingdom of Arles (present day France and Switzerland). As an adult he refused an honorable marriage and determined instead to give his life in service to the Church. He became a priest in northern Italy and spent more than four decades doing missionary work in the Alps. He built schools and churches, and is especially known for aiding travelers. The area where he ministered had an ancient, snowy, and

dangerous pass winding through the mountains along which pilgrims traveled to and from Rome. To serve the pilgrims St. Bernard built a hospice at the highest point of the pass, 8,000 feet above sea level. Later he founded another hospice along another smaller pass. St. Bernard obtained papal approval for communities of priests to serve in the hospices, which have generously aided travelers for more than a millennium. The priests and their well-trained dogs (the St. Bernard breed named for the saint) would seek and rescue lost pilgrims. St. Bernard was declared the patron saint of skiers and mountain climbers by Pope Pius XI in 1923. His feast day is celebrated on May 28.





### SENT EVANGELIZATION COMING TO GRETNA Catholic Door to Door Ministry

Join the parishioners of St. Charles Borromeo in Gretna for a presentation and training from the founder of Sent Evangelization, Austin Habash, on Saturday, June 14 from 9:30 AM to 4 PM in the St. Charles Borromeo Gym (7790 192nd St, Gretna) as they embark on a door-to-door evangelization initiative. St. Charles has grouped their parishioners into Evangelists (those that knock doors and pray for/with neighbors), Intercessors (those that pray for the Evangelists and the neighbors they encounter), and Support (those who fund the initiative and follow up with/assist neighbors in need). Austin will present how each group operates and plays a crucial role in evangelizing those living right next door. He will follow up the training



by guiding the group in their first Sent outing and finish by leading a debrief of the experience. ## ARE YOU A PRODIGAL SON OR THE OLDER BROTHER Receive the Lord's Love



If we are honest with ourselves, when reading or listening to the account of the Prodigal Son, sometimes we can put ourselves in the place of the Older Brother, thinking that we are not the Prodigal Son, not recognizing the reality of our own sins.

The Older Brother is the one who is upset at the Prodigal Son's return and resentful when the

father held a great feast: "Now his elder son was in the field; and as he came and drew near to the house, he heard music and dancing... he was angry and refused to go in. His father came out and entreated him, but he answered his father, 'Lo, these many years I have served you, and I never disobeyed your command; yet you never gave me a kid, that I might make merry with my friends. But when this son of yours came, who has devoured your living with harlots, you killed for him the fatted calf!" —Luke 15:25-30

Often we are that Older Brother, upset at all of these "sinners" who go to Mass, or who claim to be "Catholic." We may like to point our finger at public sinners and claim that we are not like them. This Older Brother syndrome is not spiritually healthy, as it disposes us to have a very prideful view of ourselves.

#### BEING THE PRODIGAL SON

Instead of being angry at other people, we need to point the finger at ourselves and to approach our Loving Father to feel the warmth of His embrace. St. Francis de Sales explains this in one of his meditations in the *Introduction to the Devout Life*: "Humble yourself in your wretchedness. O my God, how dare I come before Thine Eyes? I am but a corrupt being, a very sink of ingratitude and wickedness... throw yourself at the Lord's Feet as the Prodigal Son, as the Magdalene, as the woman convicted of adultery. Have mercy, Lord, on me a sinner! O Living Fountain of Mercy, have pity on me, unworthy as I am."

When we are able to identify as the Prodigal Son, then we can experience God's mercy in its fullest extent: "Resolve to do better. Lord, with the help of Thy Grace I will never again give myself up to sin. I have loved it too well;—henceforth I would abhor it and cleave to Thee. Father of Mercy, I would live and die to Thee."

The next time you spend time in prayer, ask yourself, "Am I the Prodigal Son? Or am I the Older Brother?"

## DON'T FORGET THE JUBILEE: Making the Most of a Holy Year

While the Catholic world is swept up in the excitement of a new pope, the Jubilee Year of 2025 quietly continues, now entering its second half. Declared by Pope Francis as a Jubilee of Hope, this Holy Year is more than a series of Vatican events. It's a global invitation to renewal, mercy, and mission. So if you've been meaning to do something for the Jubilee but haven't yet, there's



still time. And no, it doesn't require a plane ticket to Rome (though that's always an option). Here's how to make the most of the Jubilee Year—wherever you are.

- 1. Make a Pilgrimage—Near or Far—Traditionally, Jubilee pilgrims walk through the Holy Door in St. Peter's Basilica or one of the other major basilicas in Rome. But Pope Francis also designated Holy Doors in cathedrals and shrines around the world. Check with your local diocese (https://archomaha.org/2025-jubilee)—your nearest pilgrimage site may be just a drive or train ride away. Walking through a Holy Door is a powerful symbol of entering into God's mercy. For those able to travel, Rome is offering a full calendar of Jubilee events, including special Masses, catechesis, and processions. Visit the official site (https://www.iubilaeum2025.va/en.html) for details and registration.
- 2. Reconcile and Begin Again—Jubilees are rooted in Biblical traditions of release and restoration (Leviticus 25). That spirit is lived out today through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Whether you've been away from Confession for months or decades, this is the moment to go. As Pope Francis reminded us, "God never tires of forgiving us; we are the ones who tire of seeking His mercy" (Evangelii Gaudium, 3). Confession isn't about shame—it's about starting over. Let the Jubilee be your clean slate.
- 3. Practice Concrete Works of Mercy—The Jubilee indulgence—granted to pilgrims and penitents during the Holy Year—is not only spiritual. It's linked to tangible acts: visiting the sick, feeding the hungry, clothing the naked. These corporal works of mercy are timeless, and they offer a way to embody the Jubilee's theme of hope. Find a local charity, write to someone in prison, offer a ride to a neighbor. Each act builds the Kingdom.
- 4. Travel with Intention—If you're already planning a summer holiday, consider adding a spiritual layer. Visit a monastery, a Marian shrine, or a church with deep cultural roots. Cities like Lourdes, Fatima, and Kraków are rich in Catholic heritage—but so are lesser-known places like the Sanctuary of Our Lady of Montserrat in Spain or the Abbey of Saint-Maurice in Switzerland. Wherever you go, there'll surely be one. Let your trip be both restorative and sacred.
- 5. Set a Jubilee Goal—Think of this Holy Year as a spiritual reset. Is there a habit you want to change? A part of your prayer life you've neglected? Choose one area of personal transformation and make it your Jubilee intention. That focus might be attending daily Mass once a week, reading a Gospel each month, or volunteering consistently. Small steps matter.

A Jubilee is both a celebration of mercy and a call to renewal. As we pass the halfway mark, don't let this holy time slip by unnoticed. The door is still open—literally and spiritually. Walk through it.

## CATHOLIC DEVOTIONS EXPLAINED Hail Mary Prayer



The words of the Hail Mary—undoubtedly the most recognizable Catholic prayer after the Lord's Prayer—are deeply rooted in Scripture. The opening lines of the prayer are taken from the words of the angel Gabriel at the Annunciation—"Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee." This line is known as the Angelic Salutation. The following words—"Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb, Jesus"—echo the sentiments expressed by Elizabeth at the Visitation.

The Angelic Salutation is regarded as the earliest devotional prayer to Mary, since it forms the very first words spoken to her as the Mother of God, but Catholics did not begin to utilize the Hail Mary prayer in its current form until around the 11th century. An in-depth explanation of each line of this prayer is provided in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2676-2677.
