

REFLECT AND RESPOND

1st Sunday of Advent

FIRST READING (IS 2:1-5)

The prophet Isaiah envisioned a future with no more wars and nations united in belief and worship of Israel's God. What does a world totally at peace look like?

SECOND READING (ROM 13:11-14)

Paul encouraged the Romans to live with a sense of urgency in anticipation of their own salvation. What motivates you to live a moral life?

GOSPEL (MT 24:37-44)

Jesus taught his disciples that no one knows when the Son of Man will return, so you must always be prepared. How do you plan to use the season of Advent this year to welcome Jesus into your life?

GOSPEL MEDITATION



A few years ago, my house was broken into on Super Bowl Sunday. Turns out, it's a great day for burglars. If the TV isn't on, people are probably watching the game somewhere else, so... easy pickins'. I'll never forget walking into my bedroom and realizing someone had been there. My stuff was thrown all over the floor. The closet was torn apart. It was disorienting and disturbing—someone had invaded the space I thought was secure. After that, I bought an alarm system. And every Super Bowl Sunday since, I'm extra careful to lock the doors and keep the lights on. That experience made me more alert. Not scared. Just attentive.

That's much like the spiritual place Jesus wants us to be on this First Sunday of Advent. He doesn't start the season with soft candlelight and cozy manger scenes. He starts with two brutal images: a flood and a thief. In other words, chaos and violation.

Why? Because life will flood us. Chaos will come. And in the midst of it, Christ will come like a thief—not to steal from us, but to steal us back. He is the intruder we should want. The one who breaks in, not to ransack, but to rescue.

Christ presents Himself as the thief but also the new Noah. He builds the ark of the Church to carry us through the flood. And He invites us to join Him. How? By participating fully in our parishes. By making our homes places of prayer. By guarding our hearts with truth. By refusing to let spiritual complacency leave us exposed. By repentance.

This Advent, don't just stay vaguely "awake." Prepare. Build. Watch. The flood will come. But so will He.


CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

QUESTION:

When we say the Penitential Act at Mass, why do we strike our chest three times?

ANSWER:


Our rituals and liturgical celebrations are filled with a variety of symbols, some of which also relate to our gestures and physical postures (e.g. kneeling, sitting, processing, making the Sign of the Cross). The custom of striking our breast three times during the "I Confess" of the Penitential Act of the Mass is one of those gestures that is loaded with symbolism.



The tradition of Christian's striking the breast (above the heart) is rooted in the image of Sacred Scripture, especially texts like Psalm 51 which speak of a "humbled contrite heart" or how God heals broken hearts, binding up our wounds (see Psalm 147:3). Early Christian writers like St. Augustine of Hippo and St. Jerome also refer to this custom in their writings.

Ultimately, this practice is an expression of our sorrow for those times when we have been guilty of faults and a sign that we are willing to take responsibility for our sins and failings. That we all perform this gesture together is also an act of solidarity, recognizing that none of us, regardless of where we are on our journey of faith, is without fault and the need for grace and forgiveness.

SAINT ANDREW Apostle and Martyr




St. Andrew (1st c.) was the first of the twelve Apostles to follow Jesus, after being a disciple of St. John the Baptist, the Precursor of Christ. St. Andrew was a fisherman by trade and the younger brother of St. Peter. Andrew recognized Jesus as the prophesied Messiah and left his fishing trade behind to follow Jesus, convincing his brother Simon Peter to do the same. After Jesus' Ascension into Heaven, Andrew preached the Gospel throughout the world as commanded by Christ. He ministered and preached in

Asia Minor before finally being martyred by crucifixion in the city of Patras in Achaea, Greece. He was tied to an X-shaped cross by request, not deeming himself worthy to die on the same kind of cross as his Savior. Andrew suffered for two days before dying, while continuing to preach Christ from his cross. St. Andrew's feast day is November 30.

SAINT FRANCIS XAVIER

Priest

St. Francis Xavier (1506–1552) was born in his family castle in Navarre in what is today Spain. While studying in Paris he met St. Ignatius of Loyola and joined him in the foundation of the Society of Jesus. Instead of devoting himself to academic pursuits as he had planned, and in which he enjoyed great success, he became the first Jesuit missionary priest. His missionary activity began in Goa, India and extended across the Orient. St. Francis Xavier was known throughout the Far East for his humility, care of the



poor, and miracles including healings, speaking in tongues, and prophetic powers. His passion for Christ and zeal for souls won him many converts to the faith. It is said that during his missionary journeys he baptized over 40,000 people. He is considered by many to be one of the Church's greatest missionaries since St. Paul the Apostle. In his travels he left behind flourishing churches that were the foundations of the Catholic Church in Asia. He is the patron saint of navigators, missionaries, African missions, India, Japan, China, and New Zealand. St. Francis Xavier's feast day is December 3.

SAINT BARBARA

Martyr



St. Barbara (3rd c.) was born in Nicomedia in modern day Turkey. According to tradition, after the death of her mother she was raised by her rich and tyrannical pagan father who, because of her beauty and intelligence, guarded her closely, keeping her locked away in a tower to protect her from the outside world. She was educated by tutors and came to reject the false gods she was taught to worship in favor of the true God for whom she yearned and wished to discover, dedicating her life and virginity to this

purpose. She developed a prayer life and resisted her father's attempts to have her marry. Believing Barbara to be negatively affected by the seclusion, her father allowed her more freedom to associate with the world. She soon discovered Christians, and, recognizing the Creator she sought, and was baptized in secret. After informing her father that she was a Christian, he denounced her to the authorities under the persecution of Roman Emperor Maximian. She was imprisoned and cruelly tortured, but remained steadfast in her faith. During the night she would pray fervently, and her wounds would miraculously heal. This only subjected her to greater torments, followed by more miraculous interventions. She was finally beheaded by her own father, and afterward he was struck and killed by lightening as punishment. St. Barbara is the patron saint of firemen, armorers, artillerymen, military engineers, miners, and others who work with explosives. She is also the patron against storms, lightning, and fire, to name a few. St. Barbara's feast day is December 4.



GIVING OPTIONS AT ST. PATRICK CATHOLIC CHUCH Celebrate Giving Tuesday, December 2

Celebrated on the Tuesday following Thanksgiving, *Giving Tuesday* kicks off the charitable holiday spirit and motivates endof-year giving. At a time when we are all experiencing the challenges of a tight economy and high inflation, generosity is what brings people of all races, faiths, and political views together across the globe. Generosity gives everyone the power to



make a positive change in the lives of others and is a fundamental value anyone can act on.

St. Patrick Church asks all parishioners to prayerfully consider their return to God and His Church through stewardship consisting of these equally important elements—Prayer and Presence, Gifts of Service or Time and Talent, and Financial Gift or Treasure. We are a tithing parish and recommend 5% of a family's gross income go to our parish, 1% to the Omaha Archdiocese, and 4% to other charities of your choice.

ELECTRONIC FUNDS TRANSFER (EFT)

Through EFT, the parish office manages your online tithing account for you where you authorize St. Patrick to debit your bank account or credit card, allowing an automatic deposit into the bank account of St. Patrick. This is referred to as a "Managed Account." If interested, visit the home page of our parish website and click on the Online Giving button, then under Electronic Funds Transfer, click on the "EFT Form" button. Print out and return this completed authorization form to the parish office with your voided check or savings deposit slip or provide your credit card information on this same form.

ONLINE GIVING

Online Giving allows you to directly manage your own account where you can make contributions without writing checks or worrying about cash donations. This is referred to as an "Independent Account." You can access the St. Patrick online contributions page where you can set up and directly manage an account for automatic giving via checking, savings, or credit card, determine the timing or amount of your recurring gifts, or provide one-time donations for special collections or causes. Simply go to the home page of our parish website and click on the Online Giving button, and under Online Giving, click on the "Sign Up Now" button.

ENVELOPES

If electronic or online giving is not an option for you, St. Patrick offers church offering envelopes on a bi-monthly basis (e.g., a pack of a two-month supply of envelopes are mailed to you every other month). This occurs automatically upon registration as a parishioner unless the parish office has been notified that you do not wish to receive envelopes due to your choice of one of the other giving options. As you know, St. Patrick also gladly accepts cash donations at Mass. However, if you want us to record your contribution and include it on giving statements for income tax purposes, we can only do so if you use envelopes, contribute by check, EFT, or online giving. 



ST. ANDREW'S NOVENA Pray from November 30 through December 24

The St. Andrew's Novena—which begins on this Apostle's feast day—consists of a short, beautiful prayer that is recited fifteen times a day in honor of Our Lord's Nativity. It is not a novena in the literal sense of the word, because it lasts much longer than nine days—beginning on November 30 and finishing on Christmas Eve, which makes it 25 days long. (If you're a numbers person, that means this novena prayer is recited a total of 375 times!)



The tradition is of uncertain origin, but possibly began in Ireland about a century ago and has become immensely popular. Like most novenas, it is not only a sincere act of devotion, but also a way to offer God the intentions that are close to your heart. It is piously believed that those who pray this novena faithfully will receive what they ask.

The prayer is as follows:

Hail and blessed be the hour and moment in which the Son of God was born of the most pure Virgin Mary, at midnight, in Bethlehem, in piercing cold. In that hour vouchsafe, I beseech Thee, O my God, to hear my prayer and grant my desires, through the merits of Our Savior Jesus Christ, and of His blessed Mother. Amen.

You can pray the fifteen iterations all at once, rosary-style, or you can break them up throughout the day.

CATHOLIC DEVOTIONS EXPLAINED Advent Wreath



The Advent Wreath as we know it today is a modern spin on an ancient practice—or rather, several of them.

Christians have always utilized candles to illustrate the metaphor of Christ as the "great light" shining on a people waiting in darkness (Isaiah 9:2). Historians tell us that pre-Christian societies in Europe also viewed candles as symbolic of the coming light of spring, and may have used wreaths of natural material along with these candles. Traditions and rituals surrounding an "Advent Wreath" are often thought to have originated in the Lutheran tradition in 16th-century Germany. Today, Advent Wreaths are a

practice embraced by most Christians in the Western world.

An Advent Wreath consists of a circle of evergreen and four candles, one for each week of Advent. Three of the candles are purple; one is rose, representing Gaudete Sunday, a time of rejoicing at the closeness of Christmas. In Catholicism, Advent Wreaths are blessed on the First Sunday of Advent. For Advent Wreaths in private homes, it is appropriate for a family member to perform the blessing.




